TOMATO-BEEF SAUCE

WITH SPAGHETTI

Ingredients: 2 tablespoons olive oil, 1 small onion (finely chopped), 1/2 pound ground beef chunk, 1 clove garlic (crushed), 1 can (10 ounces) tomato sauce, 1 can (10 ounces) sliced mushrooms, 1/2 teaspoon salt, pepper, 1/2 teaspoon sugar, 1/4 teaspoon chili powder, 1 tablespoon catchup, 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 4 ounces spaghetti, 3 quarts boiling water, 2 teaspoons salt.

Method: Heat olive oil in 10-inch skillet; add onion and cook gently until lightly browned — about 5 minutes. Add beef and crushed garlic; mash with fork times over high heat until crumbled and beef loses red color. Add tomato sauce, mushrooms (including liquid in can), 1/2 teaspoon salt, pepper to taste, sugar, chili powder, catchup and Worcestershire sauce. Simmer about 10 minutes. Meanwhile cook spaghetti in boiling water with 2 teaspoons salt until just tender — 10 to 15 minutes. Drain and serve with meat sauce. Makes 2 very large servings.

The reception following will be in Salem Woman's club house.

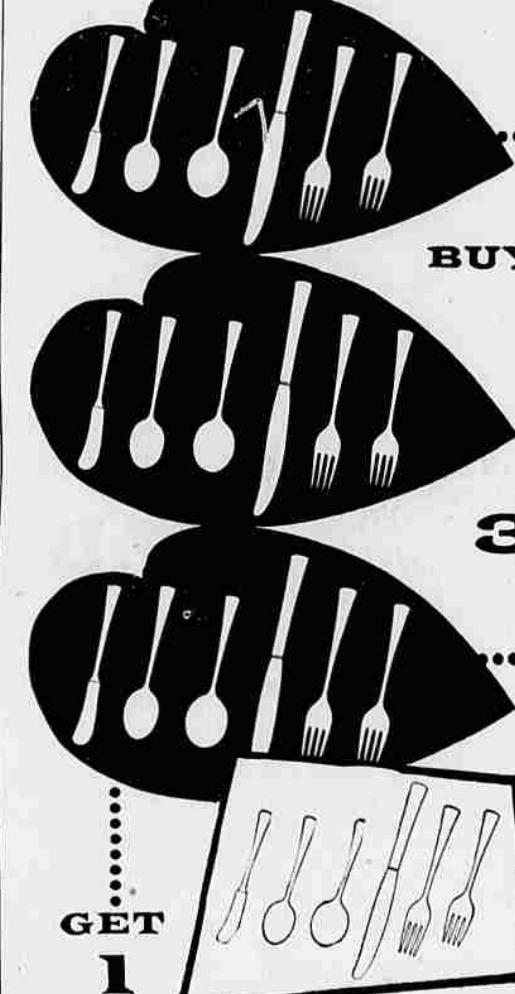
