Spanish Boy to Carry Flag in Pageant Replacing DAR Fete

DENVER (AP)—A boy of Spanish-American descent will carry the Stars and Stripes in a patriotism pageant Feb. 22 at the State Industrial School for Boys at Golden. The program on Washington's birthday will replace one scheduled for Tuesday at the school. This was canceled after an official of the Denver chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, made the comment: "I wouldn't want a Mexican to carry Old Glory — would you?"

The DAR was the announced sponsor of the canceled program. Gunnar Soelberg, industrial school director, said the Feb. 22 program will be arranged by teachers at the institution and a color guard of Boy Scouts will carry the flag. Gov. Steve McNichols has asked DAR officials to refrain, for the time being, at least, from sponsoring any programs at state institutions. DAR spokesmen have declined to comment on the governor's request. Meanwhile, the elderly widow who made the remark about the "Mexican" and the flag insisted her intentions had been misunderstood.
