Commons OKs Defense Policy After Grim Warning

LONDON A—The British government says the Soviet Union is developing a nuclear - headed rocket that can climb more than 100 miles into space at speeds of more than 5,000 miles an hour.

To prevent possible attack by such weapons, Defense Minister Duncan Sandys told the House of Commons, Britain must be pre-pared to meet it with devastating

After hearing Sandys' report,
the House voted 302-243 in support
of the month-old Macmillan government's defense policies. The
vote followed party lines. An opposition Laborite motion to censure the government charged
waste and mismanagement in defense.

Warning that this country might "soon be open to attack by bal-listic rockets." Sandys said: "There is every reason to be-lieve the Russians have been de-

releping a much enlarged version of the German V2 rocket but with the enormous difference that it will carry a nuclear warhead, and with a range sufficient to reach Br tan from launching sites within Soviet - controlled territory."

Sandys said he is confident a
defense can be provided against
weapons of the type he described,
but added "it would be absurd to
pretend" such defense measures
could be evolved quickly.

House Blocks Deduction of **Dues to Union**

Dues to Union

Labor-backed legislators revolted Wednesday against a bill that would have permitted the state to deduct union dues from wages of state employes.

With Democrats leading the way, the House soundly whipped the proposal, sponsored by Rep. Sam Wilderman (R), Portland, by a vote of 39 to 18. Twenty-one Democrats joined 18 Republican opponents, while two Republicans went along with the 16 Democrats who voted approval.

Rep. Richard Groener (D), Milwaukie, opened the attack on the bill, asserting that payroll deductions "are reaching a point where eventually we'll be paying all the workers' bills."

Rep. George Layman (R), Newberg, said "the state opened the door to wholesale deductions two years ago when it approved withholdings for the United Fund. Where do we stop?"

Rep. Robert A. Bennett (R), Portland, who led an unsuccessful fight in the Legislature several years ago to prevent the state from withholding income taxes from paychecks, said he had been paying union dues for 50 years.

"If you have the right kind of a union, the members will pay their dues themselves," he said.

Bennett said he is preparing a bill to repeal the state withholding tax law.

Wilderman said he introduced the hill because he felt the deduction "would be a convenience for state workers."

military post.

Columbus, Ga. His parents are
Mr. and Mrs. Robert W. Moore
of Virginia Beach.
Edwards was convicted of the
slaying of a German girl at Kitzinen, Germany, in March 1953.
His wife, a daughter, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry N. Edwards, live at Ardmore.
