

Bears' Unbeaten String At Stake at Washington

Friday Finds UCLA at Oregon

California's Bears, on top of the Pacific Coast Conference, put their undefeated league record to the roughest test so far in games this weekend on the home court of the Washington Huskies.

It was the third place Huskies who downed previously unbeaten UCLA two weeks ago and sank the Bruins to No. 2 in the league.

California has a 10-0 record, UCLA 8-1 and Washington 10-2.

UCLA invades tail-end Oregon Friday and Saturday, Southern California plays at Stanford and Oregon State travels to Idaho. Washington State is idle.

Bears Win Twice
California won twice from Idaho last weekend, as did UCLA from Stanford and Washington from Oregon. USC and Washington State split. Oregon State was idle.

The Bears ran up a 71-56 score against the Vandals Saturday after grabbing an 18 point lead at the half. Idaho's Wayton Coleman found Larry Friend's number under the boards and held the usually heavy scorer to six field goals, plunked in 20 points.

Gonzales Leading Rosewall 8-4 On Tour

NEW YORK — An ugly hand blister may achieve what the world's best tennis players have been unable to do—knock Pancho Gonzales off his professional throne.

The 28-year-old pro champion from Los Angeles disclosed today the recurrence of a hand injury which first struck him in Australia last fall, and he said ominously: "If this thing gets any worse, I'll have to quit the tour."

The tall, swarthy Californian of Mexican extraction bared his inflamed paw after crushing Ken Rosewall in the Australian's American pro debut here 11-4 at Madison Square Garden yesterday, 6-2, 6-4, 6-2.

The victory took only 60 minutes and sent the pro tourists on to Dallas, where the 100-match series will be resumed tonight, with Gonzales leading 8-4.

Kramer Disturbed
Promoter Jack Kramer, whose present tour stands to gross more than a quarter of a million dollars, was disturbed over the development but said he expected his big star to continue.

"Pancho has a signed contract with me to play 100 matches," Kramer said. "If he doesn't fulfill that contract he stands to lose his professional title and with it all the guarantees of future tours."

"If Gonzales is forced out of action—and I don't anticipate it—then we will continue with the men we have, Pancho Segura and Dinky Pails—and try to get Frank Sedgman or Tony Trabert. Then we'll match the best available player against Rosewall."

All three can haul up conference pennants this week—while the rest of the major college hopefuls start a string of title show-downs.

BYU can become the first entry in next month's championship eliminations by defeating Utah Thursday and clinching the Sky-line title.

Bengals Need Split
Idaho State can pick up its fifth consecutive Rocky Mountain championship with nothing more than a split against runner-up Western State in a Friday-Saturday pair.

And SMU's Mustangs, who had to wait 17 years between Southwest Conference titles, can make it three in a row by disposing of last-place Texas A&M tomorrow night and then ousting runner-up Rice Saturday.

Here's how the other conference races shape up:
Atlantic Coast—Unbeaten North Carolina gets another chance to make up time against once-powerful North Carolina State tonight. Tar Heels have first place sewed up.

Southern—West Virginia (10-0) could clinch first place and No. 1 seeding in title tournament should runner-up Washington & Lee (7-2) lose to either Virginia Tech (8-4) tomorrow or William & Mary (6-8) Friday.

Southeastern—Air may clear a bit tonight when leader Kentucky (8-2) hosts runner-up Vanderbilt (8-3).
