The pageant presented by the students of the Indian school, who come from north and southwest Indian tribes, will be open to the public. Tickets are on sale at Stevens Jewelry store. Seats are not reserved but only as many tickets will be sold as may be accommodated and are good only for the day purchased.

The brilliant array of tribal costumes, which the students have had sent on from their homes are unusually valuable and the management of the production carries heavy insurance on these non-replaceable items.

Besides the two new dances others which have come to be expected will include the Swan dance, the Hoop dance, the Feather dance, Welcome dance, all ceremonial dances. The Navajo Yellowbelly dance will also be given. The colorful pageant will be presented against a background of music and reading for which extensive research has been made by those in charge.
