

# Baylor Has at Least 3 More Games to Reach '55 Total

## Seattle Ace Up To 684 Machamer Second In Northwest With 556

The suspicion is beginning to circulate that Elgin Baylor, the poker faced point mechanic from Seattle University, is out to top the 623 points that made him the Pacific Northwest's top collegiate basketball scorer in 1955.

When the books were closed for the week Saturday Baylor had 684 points. He added 40 more Monday, which will swell his next week's total, and has at least three more games to play. Two are against Portland U. next Monday and Tuesday, after which Seattle's Chetminis will head for New York and the National Invitation Tournament.

If he gets in only one game at New York, Baylor will have to average 33 points in three tilts to match his 1955 production, when he was a star at College of Idaho. At his present pace this will be no problem. In three games Baylor has hit 54, 30 and 40.

At the week's end big Elgin had a lead of 128 points over his closest rival, Bill Machamer of Linfield. Just 10 points back of Machamer, at 546, was Merv Adams of Whitworth. Another Whitworth entry, Dave Martin, picked up 72 points in three games to climb into fifth spot with 438.

Chuck Curtis of Pacific Lutheran's rampaging Lutes ranked fourth with 453 points and tournament play could put him close to the top at the season's end. PLC will have a post-season playoff series — probably against Gonzaga — and victory there would send the Lutes into the national small-college tourney.

Rounding out the Top Ten were Larry Beck of Washington State, Dick Stricklin of Seattle U., David Gardner of Northwest Nazarene, Bruno Boim of Washington and Max Jerman of Seattle Pacific.

"It makes no difference to me what he does," said Basilio in his hotel room. "I learned plenty about Saxton in our first two fights. I think I can beat him, no matter what he does."

Saxton won a highly disputed decision over Basilio at Chicago last March by using hit-and-run tactics. When Johnny tried to slug it out with Basilio at Syracuse in September, he was stopped in nine rounds.

Basilio says his right hand is healed and he will be "shooking with it." An injury airtight hand forced postponement of the bout from its original Jan. 18 date to Friday.

Take last night, for instance. With the score tied at 65-65, Greg Britt tossed in a 35-foot set shot to give Canisius a 67-65 victory over Syracuse.

Both teams are on the prospect list for the National Invitation Tournament March 16 at Madison Square Garden. Those points by Britt might mean the difference.

Six teams have been chosen. Six berths are still vacant. In the fold are Manhattan, Seattle, Dayton, Cincinnati; Memphis State and St. Bonaventure. Prospective are Duquesne, Temple, Seton Hall, St. Peter's (N.J.), St. John's (Brooklyn), St. Joseph's (Pa.), and Lafayette, in addition to Canisius and Syracuse.

Chosen Team Wins

Among the chosen, St. Bonaventure had well last night, beating LeMoyne (N.Y.) 69-61, but Dayton fell before Xavier of Ohio 68-65. Among the hopeful, St. Joseph's won a "must" game from Penn 79-71, and Lafayette whipped Lehigh 73-60.

Conference action was on the minor side, but Yale strengthened its grip on first place in the Ivy League by downing Columbia 72-57.

The Elis held Columbia's Chet Forte to 24 points. That dropped Forte to third place in the scoring derby behind Grady Wallace of South Carolina and Joe Gibbon of Mississippi, who have averages of 30.41 and 29.33. Forte fell to 29.25.

In the Southwest Conference, Texas Christian rallied from a 20-point deficit for an 82-77 overtime triumph over Baylor to take over third place with a 5-5 record.

Virginia Military was eliminated from a Southern Conference tournament spot when Richmond topped the Keydets 76-68.
