- Black Walnut Date Loaf

- BLACK WALNUT DATE LOAF
- Ingredients: 2 1/2 cups sifted flour, 3 teaspoons double-acting baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 egg, 3/4 cups milk, 1/4 cup dark corn syrup, 1/4 cup butter or margarine (melted), 1/2 cup chopped (medium-sized) black walnuts, 1 cup finely chopped pitted dates.
- Method: Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt into a bowl. Beat egg with rotary beater (hand or electric) until it begins to get thick; add milk and corn syrup. Beat until blended. Stir in melted butter, add to sifted dry ingredients; stir just until they are moistened. Fold in chopped walnuts and cut dates. Turn into buttered loaf pan (about 9 by 3 inches); bake in moderate (350 degrees) about 1 hour or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Turn out on rack; cool. Store in tightly covered container overnight before slicing.
