



Ruts, who set new olympic rec-ords in the 5000 and 10,000 meter runs at Melbourne, was named the greatest athlete in the sport, poll-ing 48 per cent of the votes cast, O'Brien, with 26 per cent was runner-up and was named the best of all the world's field athletes with 79 per cent.
