The American Field service of New York City has designated Salem as one point of origin for foreign students who will be taken on a three weeks tour of the United States prior to their departure for home next June.

As one of the conditions of the designation, Salem folk will agree to house approximately 32 students during their one-night stay here. They will be assembled here from the Pacific Northwest.

Loren Mort, assistant principal of Leslie junior high, who has been interested in the American Field service, explained the offer of the New York office during Thursday's luncheon of the Salem Lions club.

The American Field service makes all arrangements for bringing foreign students to this country for a year's study on the high school level. Organizations like the Lions club agree to give financial assistance while some family provides a home during the student's stay.

As a part of the luncheon program, Carl Gunnarson, business manager of the Salem Senators, spoke briefly concerning the baseball situation on the local level.

Judge Orders Terrault Case Investigation

Having pleaded guilty to a charge of taking and using an automobile without consent of the owner, a pre-sentence investigation was ordered Thursday by Circuit Judge George R. Duncan in the case of Donald L. Terrault of Brooks.

Terrault was arrested last January upon the complaint of a Salem woman.

Joseph Eugene Barbara, Silverton, entered a not guilty plea to a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses. No time for his trial has been set. Barbara is accused of passing a \$20 check at a Salem store.

Marines to Put Limit on Recruits

After March 30, the only recruits taken into the organized marine corps reserves will be those with six months of active duty training, it was announced today. The corps, however, will still be open to veterans.

At present those men taking six months of active duty training must still serve seven and a half years in the ready reserves. Veterans have only that obligation remaining after their services, if any, and those over 26 years of age have no obligation.
