## P.E.O. Sisterhood Plans Program on Scholarships

Members of the several chapters of P.E.O. Sisterhood in Salem are interested in news of the education and scholarship program of the organization.

The P.E.O. Sisterhood, which originated as a college society at Iowa Wesleyan university 88 years ago, is now a philanthropic, educational organization which has a major interest in education for women. Among its educational projects are its educational loan fund, Cottey Junior college for women, and scholarships for women.

Loans up to \$1,000 at 3 per cent interest, to be used for a college education at any recognized institution, are available to girls who have satisfactorily completed one term or semester of college work. The principal of these loans need not be repaid until after the girl has completed her schooling. At present time, 800 girls in the United States are holding loans.

Cottey Junior college for women, which is located in Nevada, Missouri, was established in 1884, is owned and operated by the P.E.O. Sisterhood, and offers a program of liberal arts and fine arts. Credits from Cottey are transferable to any institution of higher learning in the United States. Graduates are eligible to study at Reid Hall in Paris for their third year. Registration at Cottey is limited to 250 girls and there is much emphasis on the cultural and religious side of life. The complete cost of tuition is \$1,150 a year.

P.E.O. works for world peace by giving international peace scholarships. This year it gave \$38,000 in scholarships to 75 girls from other lands. They are attending 33 different colleges in the United States. Two of these are attending colleges in Oregon. Akiko Oshiro from Japan is attending the University of Oregon. Fumiko Sano also from Japan, is majoring in music at Linfield college.
