STAYTON (Special)-Henry Den Herder of Lebanon has been awarded the contract for water works addition in Stayton by the city council. His bid was low among three received. Included in the contract will be

an electric pump and controls \$4,528; chlorinator and controls \$4,528; chlorinator and controls, \$3,205, and two eight-inch water meters, \$1,175, totaling \$8,908.
