Duncan Heads Stayton's '57 Bean Festival

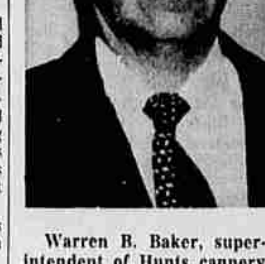
HARMON DRUSHELLA to Be Co-Chairman Of Fete
