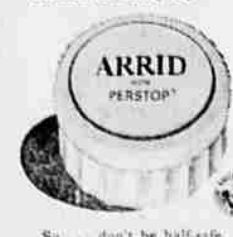

BROILED MINTED GRAPEFRUIT
Ingredients: 2 large grapefruit, 4 tablespoons finely crushed white buttermilk candies.

Method: Cut each grapefruit in half. If necessary to have grapefruit halves stand straight, cut a very thin slice from bottom rind. With small sharp knife, cut around each grapefruit section to loosen from dividing membranes; do not suit around entire outer edge of fruit. Spread 1 tablespoon crushed mint candy over grapefruit half. Place on aluminum foil on baking sheet. Bake in very hot (450 degrees) oven 10 minutes; if candy has not all melted, place under broiler for a few minutes. Serve at once. Makes 4 servings.

Note: The peppermint candy used in this recipe comes in 7-ounce packages and is available in many grocery markets.
