

# Grand Jurors And Alderman Quiz Schrank

PORTLAND (AP)—Mayor Terry Schrank was questioned by Multnomah County grand jury Thursday, one day after returning from Washington, D.C., where he appeared before Senate committee investigating charges of labor racketeering.

The mayor, looking tired, said he was subpoenaed while he was in the bathtub at home, getting ready to visit his doctor.

City Commissioner Stanley Earl, who testified earlier before the Senate committee, also was summoned before the grand jury. But later he was told he could go home and probably would be called again Monday.

In Washington, Schrank denied an accusation that he took a \$500 bribe while Multnomah County sheriff. He also declined to take a lie detector test, explaining he thought some of the questions to be asked him were improper.

Among others called Thursday before the grand jury, investigating charges of vice and corruption, was Mrs. Phyllis Detrick, secretary of Clyde Crosby, Oregon Teamsters Union boss.

Crosby, who also testified at the Senate hearing, was indicted by a previous grand jury.

# Washington's Session Ends; Budget in Red

OLYMPIA (AP)—Washington's 35th Legislature adjourned shortly after 4 a.m. Friday after approving a state budget \$41,700,000 out of balance.

The deficit figure was conceded on the Senate floor by Sen. Howard Bargreen, Democratic majority caucus chairman and head of the Senate Ways and Means Committee.

Despite the apparent deficit, Gov. Rosellini said he does not plan to call the Legislature back into special session immediately.

He added, however, if, after analyzing the state fiscal picture, he finds the Legislature has approved funds "substantially" beyond foreseeable income, he "will not hesitate to call a special session."

As the midnight deadline for winding up the 60-day session drew near, Sen. Gerald Nixon, Tacoma Democrat and retired engineer, called on the legislators to start "railroad" legislation needed for adjustment.

Ignoring the warning signals of the Republicans, the Democratic majority highballed through two major appropriation bills authorizing state agencies to spend more than a billion dollars during the two year period beginning July 1.

They sidetracked Republican attempts at amending the spending bills, using parliamentary procedure to muffle GOP moves to amend and argue individual items in the budget bills.

# Wreck Kills Ore. Woman In California

RED BLUFF, Calif. (UP)—A Portland, Ore., woman was killed and her husband critically injured yesterday when their station wagon and a pickup truck collided on Highway 90, six miles south of Corning.

The victim was identified as Mrs. Bernice Alice McCuskey, 57. Attendants at Corning Memorial hospital said her husband, Clovis Vaughn McCuskey, 55, was not expected to live. Two sons, Michael, 13, and Danny, 9, were also hospitalized with minor injuries.

The highway patrol said the driver of the pickup, Carl E. Starkey, 41, Chico, was struck by the station wagon as he made a left turn in the middle of the road.

# Crown Had a Record Year

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Crown Zellerbach Corp., Thursday reported 1956 was "the most successful in its 86-year history," with record earnings, sales and production.

Net income for the year reached \$50 million dollars, an increase of 13.4 per cent over the 44 million earned in 1955. After providing for dividends for preferred stock, net income amounted to \$33.50 per share of common stock. This compared with \$31.11 in 1955.

This income excluded a profit of \$24 million realized from sale of the company's investment in Fibreboard Products, Inc.

## Costly Credit, Caution Shrink Expansion Ideas of Executives

NEW YORK (AP)—Caution and costly credit seem to be shrinking business executives' notions of how much they should spend on expansion this year.

The total dollar output still is expected to be more than last year, although part of this is due to higher costs, and some may be spending less over from last year because material shortages then delayed some building projects.

New business plans have been whittled down to slightly under 37 1/2 billion. This still would be a record. And it would be a strong prop to the general economy.

But while this will be a 6 1/2 per cent increase over last year's record of slightly more than 35 billion, the gain appears slim against 1956's whopping 22 per cent increase over 1955.

A breakdown on business spending plans for 1957 shows the cross currents in today's business. Industries expecting to spend less include: autos, down 25 per cent; textiles, down 20 per cent; and slighter drops by tobacco and construction material firms.

Fewer stores and super markets may rise this year, as construction building is expected to be off by 6.1 per cent.

Utilities, blessed with steadily rising sales and demand for their services, are set for the biggest increase in spending of any division—more than six billion dollars, up 23.8 per cent.

Railroads will shell out 19.3 per cent more. Manufacturing companies as a whole are scheduling about 16 1/2 billion dollars for expansion, up 9.8 per cent.

# Tape Records Said Smuggled By Teamsters

DETROIT (AP)—Michigan's attorney general, Thomas M. Kavanagh, Friday asked the Senate committee investigating labor-industry racketeering to inquire into reports that the Teamsters Union in Detroit used tiny recording devices to smuggle secret testimony out of a grand jury chamber.

Kavanagh wrote Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.), chairman of the committee.

"This office has been investigating the matter, but has been hampered by the lack of subpoena power and other legal machinery."

Kavanagh said he had information indicating that members of the Teamsters Union used ingenious equipment to make wire recordings of testimony they gave in 1953 before a grand jury.

Meanwhile, Michigan's Democratic state administration, which has strong CIO support, went out of its way to disown any connection with Jimmy Hoffa of Detroit, Teamsters' vice president, who was arrested by the FBI on bribery charges.

Gov. C. Glenn Williams issued a statement saying that Hoffa's Michigan political ties are with the Republicans, not Democrats. There was no immediate comment from Republican leaders.

# Hanford Dual Reactor Plan Gets Support

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A proposal by Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) to construct a dual purpose reactor at the Hanford, Wash., atomic works to produce electric power as well as plutonium was backed Thursday night by the chairman of the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy.

Rep. Durham (D-NC) addressing the National Industrial Conference Board, said the project "will be high on the list for construction by the joint committee in coming weeks."

Jackson's bill for a reactor he said would produce 200,000 kilowatts of power in addition to plutonium passed the Senate last session but failed in the House. He said Thursday he plans to reintroduce it at the present session.

In discussing the reactor, Durham said America's "vast plants for producing weapons material, O-235 and plutonium, are turning out record quantities of material."

He questioned, however, whether it was enough.

"Unfortunately, our military planning is apparently geared to current productive capacity, instead of our needs three or four years hence," he said.

Durham told the board: "We should authorize construction of an additional plutonium producing reactor at Hanford. It would seem wise to also make provision for utilizing the waste heat for producing electric power."

Jackson has estimated a dual reactor would cost \$5 million dollars.

# Senate Group Okays British Payment Skip

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Banking Committee unanimously approved Friday an administration request for authority to postpone up to seven annual payments due from Great Britain on U.S. loans.

The committee acted promptly after a 40-minute hearing at which Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey supported the deferment plan as a "fair and businesslike arrangement."

He testified that the United Kingdom should have the breathing spell, asserted it was "perfectly plain" its international exchange situation warranted it.

Britain made the request when its military attack last fall, in company with the French, created heavy demands on the British treasury.
