## North Salem Nips Marshfield, 50-49, in Another 1-Point Win

### Paldanius' Unranked Crew to Play at 7:30; Garry Kanz Scores 17 in 19 Minutes to Lead

MEARTHUR COURT, Eugene (Special)—North Salem high school's surprising Vikings have one of the four coveted semifinals berths tonight in the state Class A-1 basketball tournament. And they did it with another one-point victory after overcoming a 12-point deficit against Marshfield here Thursday afternoon, 50-49.

The Vikings face another battle tonight against Lincoln, Portland's No. 1 entry, at 7:30, with a chance at a prize that few even dreamed possible four days ago—a spot in the finals.

Tonight's loser will meet the Eugene Central Catholic loser at 7:30 Saturday night for third place. In turn, the loser of that Saturday game will be declared sixth place winner. Thus, the Vikings can finish no worse than sixth.

**3rd Straight by 1 Point**

This was the third consecutive one-point decision for North, who nipped Sweet Home by that margin to finish the regular season. Then Coach Ward Paldanius' upstarts, who include two sophomores and two juniors, slipped by Ontario in the state opener by one slim point.

Paldanius termed the upset of Marshfield a "team victory because we outworked them" in the second half. But it was a senior, Garry Kanz, who has been used little during the season, who broke the game open in the second half.

Kanz, a senior forward who is an identical twin, played the last 19 minutes and scored 17 points with his hook shots and tip-ins. As high scorer he was outpointed by one point by Marshfield's Roger Johnson, who came close to catching North Salem at the finish.

Down 28-18 at halftime, Paldanius sent his crew back to take charge. Kanz hit two field goals and two free throws just before halftime or the gap would have been wider.

By midway through the third stanza the Pirates were ahead, 31-29, only to have Marshfield make six straight foul shots to lead, 39-31. As the period faded away, North drew within 41-37 and Dennis McKee hit a jump shot to make it 41-39.

**43-41 Beginning 4th**

Marshfield scored again and Jim Litchfield, junior Viking, followed up a shot to make the count 43-41 going into the final eight minutes.

Hardy Spurgeon pulled the Pirates ahead, 45-41, before Kent Lammers dunked two free throws and Dale Drake, junior guard, connected on a jump shot to tie the score at 45-45.

Drake put in one of two free throws, providing Salem's first lead since the Vikings were ahead 40 at the start and Kanz hooked in a field goal to make it 48-45 and McKee made good two free throws which proved to be North's last points.

Johnson fought back with a lay-in with 3:17 left to come within 40, but the Vikings tried a stall, losing possession with 35 seconds remaining.

Johnson took advantage with a jump shot as the crowd thundered. Drake and McKee passed and dribbled until the clock ran out.

Marshfield had been ranked seventh in the last pre-tournament poll while North was unranked. Marshfield had defeated Klamath Falls, No. 2 team, in the opener.

The Vikings hit 16 of 63 shots for a .254 average and got 42 rebounds, but in the first half shot under .200. Marshfield made 14 of 45 and .311, with 39 rebounds.

Leading North rebounding were Lammers with 14. Kanz with 11 and Litchfield nine.

**Ike Chestnut, Cadilli Return For TV Scrap**

NEW YORK (AP)—Having fought almost to a draw the first time, featherweight contenders Gilly Cadilli and Ike Chestnut are rated even for their return bout at Madison Square Garden tonight.

Cadilli, a 25-year-old ex-GI from Los Angeles, finished strong to nose out the 25-year-old New Yorker by one point at Houston, Tex., last Oct. 30.

"That was a big point for me," said Cadilli. "I wasn't going too good and I was even thinking of quitting the ring. The fight with Chestnut was the test. It was one of the toughest of my career. He hit me with a hook in the first round and buckled my knees but I fought it off and won. That fight showed I still belonged with the leading featherweights."

"In my next fight, I beat Miguel Berrios. If I beat Chestnut again maybe they'll let me in the elimination tournament. After all, I beat Chestnut and Berrios and Chestnut stopped Carmelo Costa."

Berrios and Costa, two of the four 126-pounders selected for the tournament to succeed retired Sandy Saddler, met at the Garden next Friday. The other two are France's Chev' Hamis and Nigeria's Hogan (Kid) Bassey.

**Fishing Report**

**NORTHWEST**—The Wilson river has been only fair for steelhead. A few good catches have been made but mostly of ripe fish. Reports indicate that bright fish, with sea lice attached, are close to spawning. If no further rain occurs, this week should be in fair shape this week end. Anglers are cautioned that both the Wilson and Alsea rivers will close after this week end. Some good salt water angling is being enjoyed in the vicinity of Harbort, Pacific City, and Salmon Bay. Kelp bass, ling cod, flounder, and sea perch are being taken in rough numbers. Storage have hindered salt water angling at Pacific City. At Lake Lytle, largemouth bass has been reported from the West catches are reported from the east side of the lake. Fishing deep. The Sandy river is still high but has good color. A few steelhead are being taken by drift and still fishing. The river should be in fine condition by the week end providing no sudden rains. Clackamas and other streams in the Willamette basin are not expected to produce well with the high water recedes. Most of the streams are murky.

**SOUTHWEST**—Lakes along the south coast are beginning to produce catches of warm-water fish. Perch and bullhead catfish predominate, but largemouth black bass are also beginning to hit well. Surf fishing has also improved along the rocks and jetties. Striped bass angling in Coos Bay is only fair at best.

**NORTHEAST**—Rivers and streams in Umatilla county are rally. Angling for steelhead has been poor. The lower Imnaha river has produced some nice catches of steelhead. The lower Grande Ronde river is high and muddy. The Snake river has been yielding some steelhead, sturgeon, and channel catfish.

**Arizin Takes Metz Wrecks Scoring Title Links Record**

NEW YORK (UP)—Paul Arizin of the Philadelphia Warriors today had his second National Basketball Association scoring championship.

Arizona, who first took the points crown in 1952, won this season's by a margin of 62 points over defending champion Bob Pettit of the St. Louis Hawks. Pettit led the scoring race until the last three weeks when he was suffering from a fractured wrist.

The Celtics won the team scoring crown with an average of 105.5 points per game, and the Rochester Royals took defense honors with an average of 95.6 allowed per game.

Arizin finished the regular (50) points a total of 1,817 points; 1,755 for the unfortunate Pettit.

## Seattle Chief Says Baylor Even Better Than Russell

SEATTLE (AP)—The university which started in basketball where Paul Bunyan stopped in the tall timber is in the East with its latest living legend, Elgin (the Rabbit) Baylor.

People still refuse to believe some of the scoring feats of little Johnny O'Brien, who carried Seattle University to national prominence during the 1951-53 college generation.

He won the first collegian to score 1,000 points in a season, hitting 1,051 in 1952. In 1953 he was, at 5-foot-9, the smallest All-America.

Now comes Baylor. "I took the Midwest and East a year to realize that Bill Russell of San Francisco U. actually existed," says Seattle Coach John Castellani. "Baylor can do everything Russell did—and more."

The East will have its look at Baylor at the National Invitation Tournament in Madison Square Garden starting March 16. Critics will see a 6-foot-6, 225-pounder who has the grace and reactions of a featherweight boxer. He has been compared to other greats beside Russell, but where most of them excelled in one department of play, Baylor is superb at all.

He scores from 20 points in the front court, ranks with the national scoring leaders and rates near the top in rebounds. His passing is sharp and crisp and he often foregoes a scoring opportunity to pass to a teammate.

Considered weak on defense at the start of the season, Baylor now carries his full share of the load. "I feel he is the greatest basketball player I've ever seen," says Castellani, "and a great team player."

For both the coach and Baylor the New York visit will be almost a homecoming. Baylor came west from Springraz High School in Washington, D. C., stopping over for one year at College of Idaho. Castellani, who was an assistant coach at Notre Dame last season, hails from New Britain, Conn.

"I never imagined that, in my first year as a college coach, I would be taking my team to a major tournament in the Garden," says the peppery mentor of the Chieftains, who is nearly a foot shorter than his star.

Baylor, who hit 54 points in one game against the national AAF football coach, Buchanan Bakers, is abetter in his shooting forays by a couple of 6-foot-7 forwards and a large collection of capable guards.

Up front are Dick Stricklin of Huntington Beach, Calif., and Thornton Humphries of Apalachicola, Fla. The usual starters at guard are Alvin Francis Saunders, and 5-foot-10 Jim Harney.

Back of this starting crew Castellani has a strong bench and he says of his squad: "It's a 10-man outfit, with plenty of hustle and desire. Wherever and whenever we're playing, it will never quit."

**Claus on Top Dallas Scoring**

DALLAS (Special)—Jim Claus led all scorers for the Dallas basketball squad during the season, with Jack Bernier running second, according to statistics covering all games played by Coach Gordon Kunkle's Dragons.

Claus had 267 total points and Bernier collected 243. Claus also had the best field goal accuracy record with a 367 mark, hitting 101 field goals in 261 attempts. Gary Henry led in rebounds with 167 and Claus was second with 163.

Dave Marsters was tops from the charity stripe, hitting 34 of 44 free throw chances for a .773 percentage.

As a team, Dallas had a better field goal accuracy record than its opponents, 356 to 347, and outscored the opponents 1190 to 1066.

## Warren Posts 30 as Eugene Enters Semis

### Cowboys Fall; Lincoln Tops Benson, Rams Outlast Grant

EUGENE (AP)—Central Catholic, Eugene, and Lincoln—three pre-tournament favorites—and North Salem were still in the running as the Oregon class A-1 basketball tournament went into the semi-final round Friday.

Central Catholic, the No. 1 team in the Associated Press poll, earned its berth by beating Grant of Portland 47-37. Eugene, the third-ranked team in the state, rolled over Pendleton, No. 5, 60-43. Lincoln, No. 4 in the poll, beat its Portland opponent, Benson, 61-46.

**Benson vs. Marshfield**

And unranked North Salem, posting its second one-point victory of the tournament, edged Marshfield 50-49. Marshfield was rated seventh in the poll.

Lincoln will meet North Salem and Central Catholic will face Eugene in the round-of-four Friday night.

Benson will be pitted against Marshfield and Grant will meet Pendleton in games leading to third place.

**Rams Hold Lead**

Central Catholic grabbed an early lead and held it for the rest of the game in its victory over Grant. Frank Adler's two baskets helped central Catholic gain its 14-9 first quarter advantage.

At the half, the score was 23-15 and at the three-quarter mark, 38-24.

Both teams had 13 field goals but Central sank 21 free throws to 11 for Grant.

A 17-point surge in the last five minutes broke the game open as Eugene rolled over Pendleton.

Pendleton looked strong in the opening minutes, piling up seven points while holding Eugene scoreless. But Eugene, aided by the baskets of Neil Goldschmidt and Charlie Warren, had moved to a six-point advantage, 27-21, at the half.

**Warren Scores 30**

Warren's 30 points was high for the game and for the first two rounds of the tournament. Pendleton's Bob Lilly and Gary Tague each had 10.

The attendance at Thursday night's games was 8,069—a record high for the second round. The attendance total through Thursday night was 41,905.

EUGENE (AP)—Albany eliminated Medford from the consolation round of the class A high school basketball tournament with a 56-40 victory Thursday.

In other losers' bracket games Thursday, Astoria whipped St. Helens 50-44. Klamath Falls defeated Ontario 55-32, and McMinnville downed Redmond 72-43.

Klamath jumped ahead, 40, at the start on two field goals by guard Butch Kimpton. It led 21-14 at the first quarter mark, 29-21 at halftime and 41-33 at the end of the third period. Midway in the last quarter Klamath led by as much as 17 points.

Astoria threatened only in the third quarter when it cut Klamath's margin to 37-33. Two quick Klamath baskets squelched this rally.

**LARGER DUCK LIMITS?**

In the current Game Commission Bulletin, P. W. Schneider says that the completed waterfowl census in Oregon reveals that record numbers of birds were given to altering season dates, and it may be possible that different dates for duck hunting may be set for the eastern and western sections of the state. He also indicates that larger bag limits may be in the offing.

**HUNTERS NOT INTERESTED IN BIG BAGS**

It is my feeling, the result of years of discussion with duck hunters, that they are not concerned so much with long seasons and big bag limits as they are with having the season extend as late as possible. Jan. 10 is the latest closing allowable, and it is the thought of this writer that whenever possible, that date should be the one that determines the season's end, even if the season is started much later than has been the case in the past. After all, any crop should be harvested when it is "ripe", and it is generally true that the best gunning occurs from the middle of Dec. on.

**HUNTERS RESPONSIBLE FOR BIRDS**

While no conservationists want to see the birds slaughtered, on the other hand they should be available to hunters when the conditions are best. Let's face a harsh but true fact: the ducks and geese are abundant today, only because of the hunters. Without the interest of the shotgunner, nobody would protect the wildfowl, and they would soon be forced into virtual extinction. The sensible thing to do is to determine the amount of birds that may be safely taken, then adjust the length of the season and bag limits accordingly, at the same time extending the season in western Oregon to the latest possible date. This can be done without injury to the migrations, and will certainly make gunners much happier.
