

Garden Club Plans Annual Primrose Flower Exhibit

MT. ANGEL (Special) — Mt. Angel Garden club members planned details at their meeting last week for their annual Primrose Flower Show. This year's show is scheduled for Sunday, April 29, and will be in the school dining room. Miss Juliana Dehler is general show chairman. It was agreed that each member of the club will have some active part in the show.

Discussion revealed that weather has not been too favorable for primroses this year but that the plants are in much better condition than last year. Most members reported some acacia, polyanthus and jolice in bloom, supplemented with the less common denticulata.

The club voted to purchase a daylight lamp to make sure that the colors will be classified correctly. Heretofore it was a usual happening that blossoms placed and classified as to color by ordinary electric lights the night before the show were found to be a different color the next morning when daylight flooded the room, and entries had to be reclassified.

Cash prizes will again be awarded to garden clubs; ribbon prizes, as always, will be given first, sec-

ond and third winners in the various divisions, and there will be the usual special prizes.

A light luncheon will be served before the judging starts in the school dining room where the show is always given.
