PICKLED SHRIMP AND EGG SALAD

Ingredients: 1 pound shrimp, 1 small onion, 2 tablespoons olive oil, 2 tablespoons white tarragon vinegar, salt, pepper, 1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard, 1/4 teaspoon dried crumbled oregano, 1 small garlic clove (crushed), 4 eggs, mayonnaise or mayonnaise type dressing, salad greens.

Method: Cook, shell and devein shrimp; use the size that counts about 28 to the pound. Peel onion, cut into thin rounds and separate into rings. Cut each shrimp in half lengthwise. With a fork beat olive oil, vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, pepper to taste, prepared mustard, oregano and crushed garlic together. Mix shrimp and onion rings with dressing; cover tightly and refrigerate an hour or longer. Hard-cook eggs and cut in half lengthwise; remove yolks and mix with enough mayonnaise to moisten, and salt and pepper to taste. At serving time arrange marinated shrimp and stuffed eggs on salad greens. Makes 4 servings.
