SHRIMP WITH FRAN'S DIP
Ingredients: 1/2 cup tomato catch-up or seafood cocktail sauce, 1/2 cup chili sauce, 1 medium-sized green pepper (finely minced), 1/2 cup onion (finely minced), 1 tablespoon bottled grated horseradish, 1 teaspoon pepper, juice of 1 lemon, 3 pounds shrimp (cooked and shelled and deveined).

Method: Stir together the catch-up, chili sauce, minced green pepper, minced onion, grated horseradish, pepper, and lemon juice. Chill in a tightly covered bowl overnight. Serve in a small bowl surrounded by the cooked shrimp. This makes enough dip for the three pounds of shrimp, serving 12. If any sauce is left over, store in tightly covered jar in refrigerator.

Note: To cook the 3 pounds of shrimp, add 1 tablespoon pickling spices to 2 1/2 to 3 quarts water; bring water to a boil; add the shrimp; bring to simmering; cover saucepan and simmer 3 to 5 minutes. Drain shrimp at once, shell, de vein and chill.

SHRIMP WITH FRAN'S DIP
Ingredients: 1/2 cup tomato catch-up or seafood cocktail sauce, 1/2 cup chili sauce, 1 medium-sized green pepper (finely minced), 1/2 cup onion (finely minced), 1 tablespoon bottled grated horseradish, 1 teaspoon pepper, juice of 1 lemon, 3 pounds shrimp (cooked and shelled and deveined).

Method: Stir together the catch-up, chili sauce, minced green pepper, minced onion, grated horseradish, pepper, and lemon juice. Chill in a tightly covered bowl overnight. Serve in a small bowl surrounded by the cooked shrimp. This makes enough dip for the three pounds of shrimp, serving 12. If any sauce is left over, store in tightly covered jar in refrigerator.

Note: To cook the 3 pounds of shrimp, add 1 tablespoon pickling spices to 2 1/2 to 3 quarts water; bring water to a boil; add the shrimp; bring to simmering; cover saucepan and simmer 3 to 5 minutes. Drain shrimp at once, shell, de vein and chill.
