FOOD NOTES

Variety of Meats in Buy List

A variety of meats will be featured with large type and small prices in the nation's supermarkets and neighborhood grocery stores this week, but the prices won't be as "small" as in recent weeks.

Lamb is reported 2 to 6 cents a pound higher in many places, an increase matched by sirloin and rib roast although not quite so widely.

In any event, lamb (leg and shoulder) and pork (chops and roasts) are getting more of a play in the stores this week than they've been receiving recently. Veal, too, will be a special item in more stores than usual.

Since this is the season choice, grain-fed cattle are coming to market, beef again will be the No. 1 attraction in a good many stores. Chuck roast and ground beef, however, will be as numerous as the more expensive steaks and rib roasts.

Eggs, which have been bargains for some time, are 2 to 4 cents a dozen higher in many areas this week.

Spring also should provide bargains in some vegetables which have had warm weather and plenty of rain. Spring lettuce production, for example, is expected to run 8 per cent ahead of last spring's crop. Asparagus, broccoli and cauliflower also are expected to be more plentiful than usual, and therefore cheaper.

Tomatoes, onions and cabbage, on the other hand, are expected to have smaller crops, and higher prices, than a year ago this spring.

This week, however, the outstanding buys are reported to be storage potatoes from late fall crops, onions, root crops such as carrots from nearby fields and the "greens"—kale, collard, broccoli and turnip greens.

Corporation to Publish Report In Newspapers

NEW YORK (AP)—A 108-year-old corporation has come up with something new in the way of presenting its annual corporate report. The report will be published in newspapers.

Chas. Pfizer & Co., Brooklyn manufacturer of drugs and pharmaceuticals, is setting out to make its account of activities and earnings interesting and informative to the public as well as stockholders—and devised the newspaper publication idea to insure that the public will see it.

Pfizer's forthcoming report will be published March 31 as a 16-page supplement to the New York Times. On April 14 it will be published also in the Chicago Tribune and the Los Angeles Times. The combined circulation was put at more than 3,500,000.

The company describes the plan as "a new technique in financial journalism which will permit the readers of three of the nation's leading newspapers to learn firsthand how a typical corporation reports to its shareholders."

Half of the 16 pages will feature multicolor illustrations, printed specially by an artist, depicting the company's work both in experiments and in detailing the items it now produces.

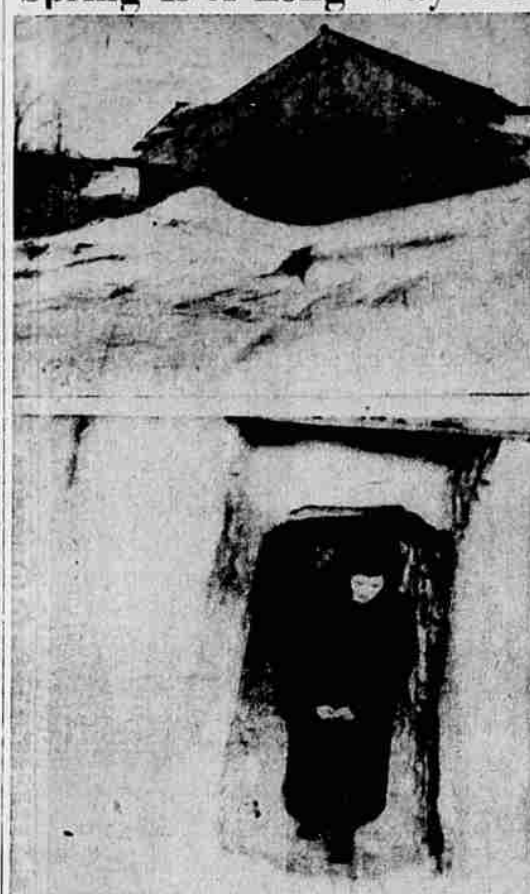
Accompanying articles will explain matters in detail. In addition, there will be the usual balance sheet and earnings statement.
