Salem Man Finally Finds Owner of 'Rising Sun' Flag

After World War II, S. Sgt. George Flagg, son of the O. E. Flagg, 1845 Berry St., found a "Rising Sun" flag with 50 signatures on it, while checking clothing at the reclamation section, Ft. Lewis.

The sergeant, who then was a private, and is now stationed at Itami Air Base, Japan, with the 6th food services squadron, during those almost 12 years, has wondered about the original owner of the flag.

Thinking the owner or his family, if he had been killed in the war, might like the flag, the sergeant discussed it with one of the Japanese employees of the squadron. The Japanese contacted the local newspapers and on Feb. 27 the story was published.

On March 4 the Yomiuri newspaper located the owner of the "Rising Sun" flag at Ohkawa City in Fukuoka Prefecture on the island of Kyushu. He was Fujiyoshi Miyazaki, who, when drafted into the Japanese Army in July 1945, at the age of 18 years, had the flag with him with 50 signatures of the employees of the manufacturer. It also had these words of encouragement, "Fujiyoshi Miyazaki, resolved to secure victory at any cost."

Fujiyoshi, now the operator of a furniture store and married with two children, had the flag mailed to him, though both he and the sergeant have expressed the hope that the other could travel to where he is so they could meet.

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Latin Vessel Sails Through Gulf of Aqaba

TEL AVIV, Israel, (AP)—The 715-ton Costa Rican freighter Pandora, formerly known as the Queen of Sheba, left Israel's southern port of Eilat Thursday to sail through Tiran Strait to the East African port of Massawa.

Officials do not regard the voyage as a test to establish Israel's right of innocent passage through what Egypt and Saudi Arabia call their sovereign waters, however, since the Pandora is not flying the Israeli flag. She is flying the Costa Rican flag.

Israel withdrew forces guarding the strait on the assumption her rights to passage would be safeguarded.

The Pandora is the first ship to head for the strait since the United Nations Emergency Force took control of the Gulf of Aqaba entrance on March 8.
