A 45 minute discussion period will follow the talks. Group leaders will be Eldon Cates, Pedee; Dr. R. E. Lieualten, president, Oregon College of Education; and Carl Morrison, principal, Dallas High School.

Conference moderator will be State Sen. Walter Leth.

Dallas Starts Census to Find Apportionment Population

DALLAS (Special)—Disappointed with state population estimates of 150 residents in the City, Dallas Thursday started taking its own census.

The census is in charge of members of St. Phillip's Catholic church with George Weerth acting as director. Women will make the census calls during the day and men will make the "callbacks" in the evenings. The task is expected to be finished in six days.

The census-takers have divided the City into 11 districts, and each district will be divided into blocks.

Funds from liquor taxes are apportioned by the State to towns in accordance with census estimates during years between official U.S. census enumeration. Dallas estimates its population to be 5650.

Each resident is valued at approximately \$7 in the tax distribution plan.

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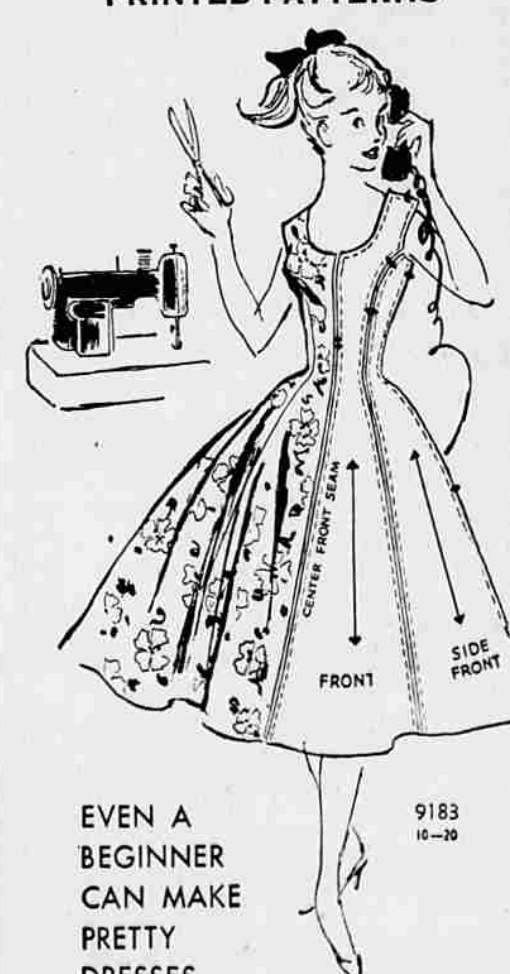
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
