

### Budget Whack Move Revives Tax Cut Talk

#### But Delay of Reduction Until Next Year Is More Likely

WASHINGTON (AP)—The prospect of budget cuts today revived talk in Congress of income tax reduction.

Incumbent House leaders took notice of it by stating privately that reduction of government spending by as much as three or four billion dollars might start a stampede for general tax relief.

But the strong possibility remained that even if the budget is cut substantially, tax cuts would be delayed until next year when Congress members could learn the actual size of a surplus, rather than an estimate of it.

President Eisenhower's budget estimates show an anticipated surplus of \$1,700,000,000 for this fiscal year ending June 30, and \$1,800,000,000 for fiscal 1958.

Might Go to 5 Billion  
If the President's 1958 spending budget of \$71,800,000,000 is cut by three billion dollars, as some Appropriations Committee members say can be done, the government would start its new business year next July 1 with a prospect surplus of nearly five billion dollars.

Some leaders feel that such a situation might make it impossible to head off demands for general tax relief.

Thus far, Capitol Hill has been in general agreement with the Eisenhower administration that tax reduction is "out" because of its inflationary aspects at a time when curbs are being placed on credit expansion. The administration has contended also that any surplus should go toward reducing the national debt.

Rep. Mills (D-Ark), influential member of the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee who frequently reflects the attitude of House leaders, said:

"If we can create three or four billion dollars of surplus through reduction of expenditures, I would want the American taxpayer to enjoy a part of that reduction."

Might Have to Cut Taxes  
Rep. McCarthy (D-Minn), also a member of the committee, said in response to a reporter's questions that in the event of a large surplus Congress might have to cut taxes "for the sake of the economy."

He said "a surplus of \$1,800,000,000 probably would be about all the economy could carry."

Rep. Eberhart (D-Pa), another committee member, predicted that a Ways and Means will recommend later this session a reduction in federal excise (sales) taxes of about 900 million dollars.

Rep. Reed of New York, the senior Republican on the Ways and Means Committee, told a reporter that he didn't expect the House to reduce taxes until 1958, an election year.

### Alaskans Slap At Neuberger

JUNEAU (AP)—Alaska Republicans dispute the charge of Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore) that a "raw, naked bitter struggle" within the party is holding up President Eisenhower's appointment of a new governor and that the Territory is suffering as a result.

Russ Arnette, president of the Anchorage Republican Club, said Neuberger's criticism "is unfounded."

Republican leaders in the Legislature declined to be quoted directly but one commented: "It just aint so."

Sid Charles, publisher of the Ketchikan News, suggested Neuberger should pay more attention to Oregon affairs and less to Alaska. He said Alaska, under an acting governor, appears to be getting along all right but that he can't say the same for Oregon, on the basis of evidence before the current Senate investigating committee hearing.

### Senate Hears '55 Resolution Not Delivered

The Oregon Senate heard Wednesday that a resolution it adopted two years ago lauding the Turkish government for its military assistance in the Korean War hasn't been delivered yet.

Sen. Warren Gill (R), Lebanon, said the resolution was adopted in April, 1955. It directed the secretary of state to transmit the Senate's expression, but the document never left the capitol, Gill said.

Gill's disclosure followed adoption of another resolution expressing sympathy to the Philippine government in the plane crash death of President Ramon Mag-saysay on Cebu Island last Sunday.

Gill suggested a liaison system between the Legislature and the secretary of state's office to see that resolutions to foreign countries are transmitted promptly.

### Bird Kayoes Town TV
