### Foresters See Conservation Exhibit

DeWitt Nelson, president of the Society of American Foresters, has watched forest growth, then he depleted and reforestation start. And, he thinks they are here to stay.

"Forest industries will go on forever," he said in talking of the West Coast forest areas. "Forests are the basic raw materials." Nelson continued, pointing out that they must be continued to stabilize the tax base and the employment level.

Discussing reforestation nationally, Nelson pointed out that in the East they were not yet dependent on a second growth timber as they now are in the southern states, where this year they are planting over a billion seedlings and next year about two billion.

**Oregon Leads**

"In the western states they are still harvesting old growth timber to a large extent," he said, noting that Oregon, through some of its firms and in the Tillamook Burn area, was leading the state of California in artificial reforestation.

"Your type of management is conducive to natural reforestation, especially in the damper parts of the state," he said. "In California they haven't learned how to successfully reestablish forests by an artificial means."

Nelson stressed the important part that the "Keep Green" program, which is nationwide, has in preserving forest areas and said, "In Oregon you are particularly fortunate in having Al Wiesendanger. He is Oregon's 'Smoky Bear,' himself, and has done a tremendous job."

### 500 Foresters Visit in Salem For Meeting

Salem was host Saturday to professional foresters from Oregon, southern Washington and northern California. They were here to attend the Columbia River Section of the Society of American Foresters.

It was the first annual meeting to be held in Salem and by 10 a.m. more than 300 had registered. Close to 500 were expected by the afternoon session.

**Chapter to Form Here**

A Salem chapter of the Columbia River Section of the Society of American Foresters was authorized by the executive committee of the section at a Friday night meeting held here prior to the opening of the annual meeting of the section. The chapter will be established July 1 and is expected to have a membership of approximately 60 technical foresters.

Registration of the group started at 8:30 a.m. and the session opened at 9:30 with a welcoming address by Gov. Robert D. Holmes. Then proposed legislation was discussed and a panel discussion held on "What Does the Young Forester Get?"

Here at the meeting was the national president of the Society of American Foresters, DeWitt Nelson, who was slated to address the section at the early afternoon session.

His subject was to be "Topics of National Importance to Professional Foresters." Panels on "Seed and Seedlings—What Next?" and "Keeping Your Stocking Up," was to complete the program for the afternoon.

Speaker for the banquet to be held in the Gold Room at the Marion Hotel Saturday night will be H. B. Douglas, Seattle, division manager for the Richfield Oil Co. He will discuss "Methods of Solving Public Relations Problems." E. P. Stamm will be master of ceremonies at the banquet.
