

### Safety Hazard Campaign for Lebanon Opens

#### Jaywalking, Speeding Will Be Targets Of Council

LEBANON (Special) — Current safety hazards reported to the Lebanon Safety Council this week were speeding and racing on several city streets, sidewalks in bad condition, obstructions to the view of motorists and jaywalking.

Volunteer Fireman Ross O'Brien said that most fire calls are to residential areas and result from carelessness, and urged a continuing program of fire prevention and elimination of fire hazards.

Fire Chief Vern Reeves conducted a tour of the fire hall and explained the function of each piece of equipment.
