Two players went to the hospital Thursday as Pacific Coast League Baseball got underway.

San Francisco downed Portland 3-0, Seattle beat Sacramento, 4-1, Los Angeles defeated Vancouver, 4-2, and Hollywood split a doubleheader with San Diego. San Diego captured the first game, 6-1, but the Stars won the second, 4-1.

Opening games drew only 25,873 persons—5,001 less than last year. The big difference was in San Francisco, where blustery weather held the crowd to 6,412 persons compared to 14,401 the year before.

Seattle struck quickly against the Solons, scoring three unearned runs in the first inning with two out. Bob Balena's two-run double was the big blow of the inning.

The Suds collected another run in the second and Ray Orler gave Seattle four more runs in the third.

He stroked it off Billy Pierce as the Redbirds blanked the Chicago White Sox 5-0 behind the mitty pitching of Lindy McDaniel and the hot hitting of Hobe Landri and also homered for St. Louis. The home run by Williams was only one of two hits collected by the Red Sox off the combined efforts of rookie pitchers Jack Sanford and Angelo Liperti of the Philadelphia Phils. Philadelphia won 7-1, helped by four unearned runs.

Mantle and Hank Bauer connected for the Yankees, but the world champs dropped a 4-5 verdict to their Richmond (International League) farmhands. Mays' homer spoiled an otherwise brilliant five-inning effort by Early Wynn, who made his first appearance of the spring. The Cleveland pitching mainstay had been bothered by a hip injury. The Indians came up with two runs in the ninth to break a tie and win 6-4.

25 New Faces to Show in Big League Lineups Opening Day

Phillies to Have 4 Changes on Diamond

NEW YORK (AP)—There's been a hefty six months turnover in major league baseball. Teams will have about 25 new players in the opening day lineups next week.

The Philadelphia Phillies will have four changes: first baseman Ed Bouchee, shortstop Chico Fernandez and outfielders Rip Repulski and Bob Bowman. Bouchee and Bowman are rookies up from Miami of the International League. Repulski was acquired from St. Louis and Fernandez from the Brooklyn Dodgers.

The New York Giants will introduce shortstop phenom Andre Rodgers. They'll also reintroduce Whitey Lockman, back from the Cards and Gail Harris, recalled from Minneapolis.

The Chicago Cubs will have third baseman Ray Jablonski, picked up from Cincinnati, and Bob Speake, brought up from the Pacific Coast League. Chicago also will have a new catcher with either ex-Yankee Charley Silveira or rookie Cal Neuman, up from Richmond, Va., likely to start.

Cincinnati will have Don Hoak at third base. The Cardinals have a new left fielder and No. 4 batter in Del Egan, the former Philadelphia star. The Dodgers probably will have Gino Cimoli in left field. He was used sparingly in

The Milwaukee Braves and Pittsburgh Pirates have remained on regulars.

In the American, shortstop Billy Hunter and outfielder Bob Cerv, both acquired from the Yankees, will be in the opening Kansas City

Athletics lineup as will second sacker Milt Graif, a former Yak farmhand.

The Chicago White Sox fans will get a glimpse of rookie Jim Landis in the outfield with Bubba Phillips, a utility man last season, at third base and Jim Rivera, an outfielder, at first base.

Cleveland has rookie outfielder Roger Maris. George Strickland, a '56 handyman, likely will start at second base, and Bobby Avila, veteran second sacker, will be at third.

Third baseman Frank Malzone and Gene Mauch, a second baseman, are the new Boston Red Sox. Malzone failed in a brief spring trial in '56. Mauch was purchased from the Coast League late last season.

Tony Kubek, in left field, is the only one to crack the starting lineup for the New York Yankees. He hit .331 for Denver of the American Assn. last season. Detroit may start Eddie Robinson, obtained from Kansas City, at first base.

The Washington Senators and Baltimore Orioles opening day lineups will be about the same.

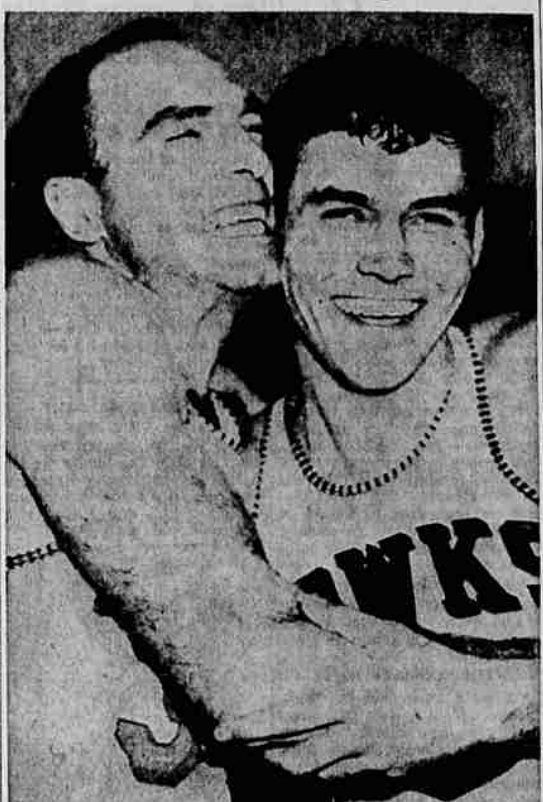
