

### Jefferson High Discloses Top 1957 Students

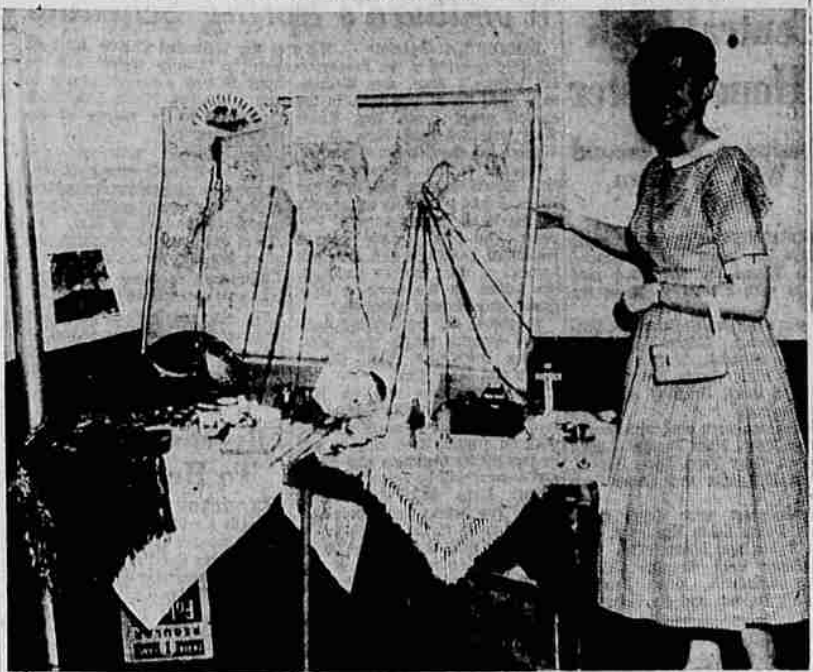
#### Arlene Swanson Leads Class With 1.38 Average

INDEPENDENCE (Special)—Increased pay for Independence volunteer firemen has been recommended by the City Council. The new scale would pay the fire chief \$4, assistant chief, \$3.50, and regular \$3 for each fire call answered and \$2 for practice meetings.

Councilmen at the last meeting also discussed a special sewer bond election, a mosquito control program, and improvement of surroundings of the swimming pool.

Councilman Dean Smith proposed the increase in firemen's pay to stimulate interest in the department. Although recommending the increase, the Council was unable to activate it at once because of budget problems.
