

Lebanon Fires Teacher After Policy Dispute

LEBANON (Special)—In special session, lasting until 2 a. m., the board of Lebanon Union High School District No. 1 passed a resolution to adhere to its former position of not renewing the contract of Leonard Gainer, vocational machine shop instructor since 1942.

Non-renewal was based on recommendation by Principal Lawrence Page, Assistant Superintendent and Curriculum Coordinator George Henderson and Superintendent James W. King.

Chairman of the board is William R. Thomas.

At a recent open meeting strong support was expressed by parents and students for Gainer's teaching policies which were in disagreement with those ordered by his superiors.

Resignation Accepted

Resignation of Ralph Wood, teacher of dramatics and social studies, was accepted by the board of Lebanon Union High School. Wood will teach in Eugene.

Elected to teach in his place next year was Carl E. Snelling, speech, English and history teacher at Bend High School.

The board appointed Floyd McReynolds and Louis Benetz for three-year terms on the school budget committee, replacing Wayne Oakley and Frank Peoples, whose terms expire.

Every Type of Primrose to Be Shown at Mt. Angel April 28

MT. ANGEL (Special)—Every type and color of primrose may be exhibited at the Primrose Flower Show to be staged by the Mt. Angel Garden Club, Sunday, April 28, from 2 to 8 p. m. in the St. Mary's school dining hall.

If no special class is provided, the flower will be shown in the rarities and oddities division. Programs have been printed and are ready for distribution.

Exhibits will be received on Saturday, April 27, from 6 p. m. to 8 p. m., and on Sunday morning, April 28, from 8 to 10 a. m. Judging will begin at 10 a. m., and no exhibits may be received after that.

Cut flower arrangements featuring primroses may be exhibited in the following classes: Driftwood, As You Like It; novice (anyone exhibiting for the first time); and One Color Arrangement in white, red, yellow, bronze, pink or blue.

Ribbon awards will be made for first, second and third places for all 11 divisions and their subdivisions. Blue ribbons will count seven points towards the sweepstake award, which will be given to the highest scoring exhibitor; red or second place ribbons will count three points, and white, one point.

Cash prizes of \$5, \$3 and \$2 will be given to the three best exhibits by Garden Clubs. All Garden Clubs are invited to exhibit; displays must fit car table size. Tables will be provided by the show management.

Commercial entries are invited, but may not compete for the special awards. A four by six foot floor space will be allowed each exhibitor. Other flowers may be used but primroses must predominate.

Awards in addition to the ribbon prizes are: General sweepstakes trophy donated by the Mt. Angel City Council; Junior sweepstake prize, given by Mr. and Mrs. George Schmidt; auricula seedling award, given by Miss Juliana Dehler, and junior seedling award, given by the Mt. Angel Garden Club.
