

## 80 Persons Attend Food Confab Here

Some 80 persons, employed in state institutional kitchens, are attending the third annual Oregon Institutional Food Service Conference here.

The two-day conference, being held at Hillcrest School for Girls, opened at 8:30 a.m. Thursday and will conclude Friday afternoon. Speaking to the group at the opening session was Gov. Robert D. Holmes.

On the program for the meeting are talks with food specialists, food films and panel discussions.

The kitchen facilities at MacLaren School for Boys, the Oregon State Tuberculosis Hospital and at Hillcrest will also be visited.

Speakers on the program are Miss Maxine Buren, food editor of the Oregon Statesman; Mrs. Florence Scott, nutritionist for the State Board of Health; A. L. Jarvis, MacLaren School; Charles Terry, director of the State Civil Liberties Commission; Miss Lavern Owens, food administrator for the California Department of Mental Health; Prof. S. T. Ford, Oregon State College; and Dan Beecher, food service director at Portland State College.

## South Parents Elect Stewart

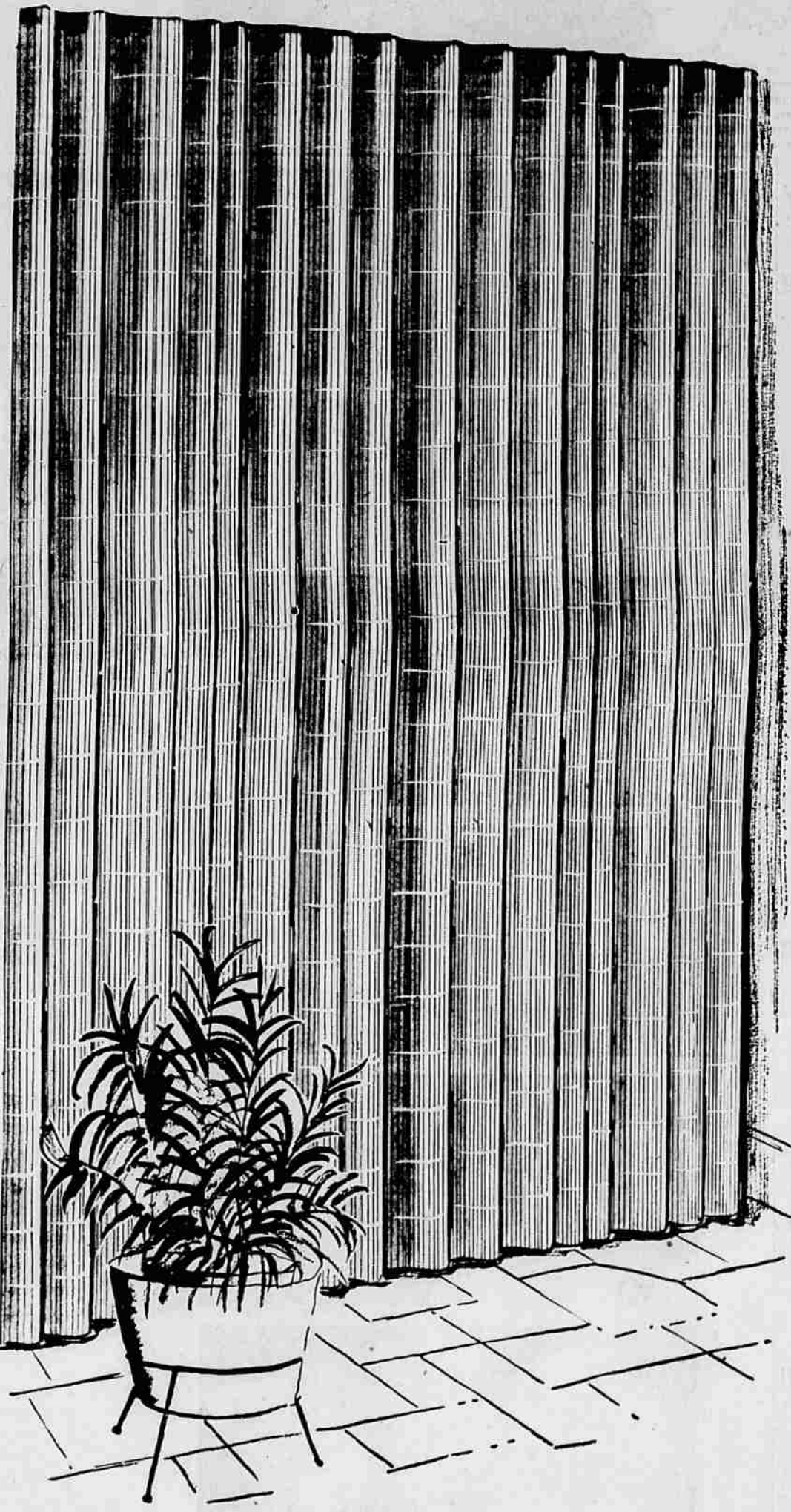
The South Salem High School Parents Club elected W. E. Stewart Jr., president at a recent meeting. He succeeds Gordon Barker.
