Receiver for Ply Firm Set

ALBANY (Special) — Ed Kellenberger, Lebanon lumberman, has been appointed receiver for the Linn Plywood Corp. of Albany by Circuit Judge Victor Olliver. He will direct affairs of the company until disposition is made of bankruptcy proceedings. The petition in bankruptcy was filed by James E. Perse, president of the firm; Hugh Thompson and Philip J. Braden. The petition states that a mortgage for \$117,000 is held by Roddis Plywood Corp., an eastern brokerage firm. It also avers that the firm has withheld \$122,927.15 from plywood shipments during the last year, but refuses to surrender the mortgage.

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
