**FINGER SPARERIBS**  
Ingredients: 3 pounds sparerib racks, 1/4 cup dark molasses, 1/4 cup prepared mustard, 3 tablespoons garlic-flavored vine-gar, 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce, 1 teaspoon paprika, 1 teaspoon tabasco sauce, 1/4 teaspoon brown bottled gravy sauce.

Method: Have meatman cut sparerib racks lengthwise into strips that are 2 inches wide. With kitchen scissors, cut rack strips into individual ribs. Place ribs in shallow roasting pan. Mix molasses and mustard thoroughly; stir in vinegar. Worcestershire sauce, paprika, tabasco sauce and brown gravy sauce. Spread spareribs with sauce. Roast in a moderate (350 degrees) oven, spreading ribs often with sauce for 1 1/2 hours. Drain on paper towels or brown paper and serve in chafing dish or other container that can be kept hot. Makes 12 servings.

Note: These may be prepared ahead, wrapped in aluminum foil and frozen or refrigerated until ready to use. To reheat, place foil wrapped package in shallow pan; open foil. Brush with additional sauce. If frozen, spareribs will need 1 hour at 325 degrees; if refrigerated, reheat for 25 to 40 minutes at 325 degrees.

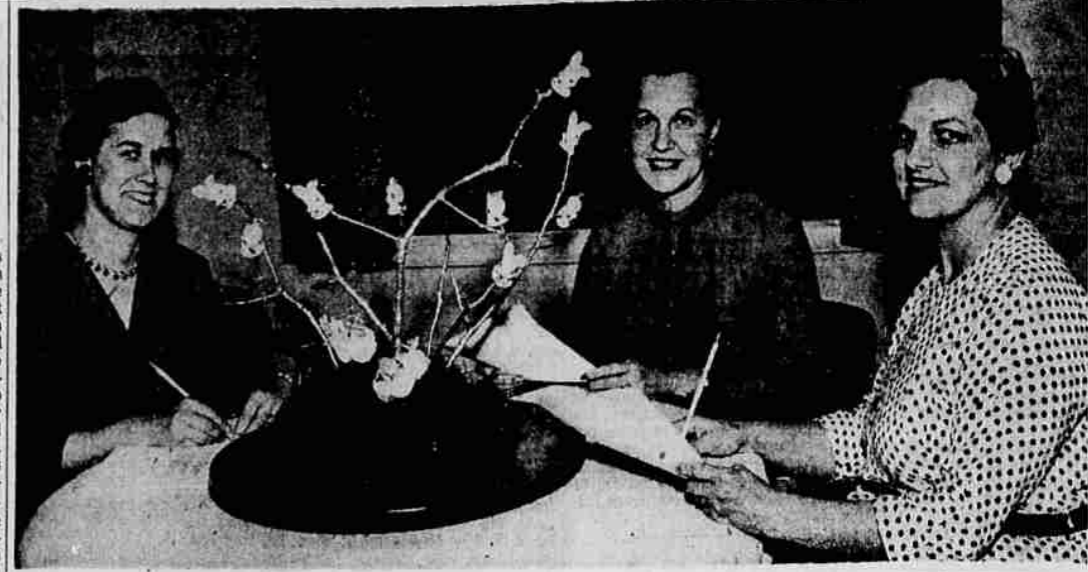
