Pantryshelf vegetable dish! Asparagus with Cheese Sauce Stuffed Eggs Buttered Toast Fruit and Cookies Beverage ASPARAGUS WITH CHEESE SAUCE
Ingredients: 1 cup (1 1/2 ounces) asparagus, milk, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/4 cup lightly-packed grated cheddar cheese, paprika.
Method: Drain asparagus; add enough milk to the liquid to make 1 cup. Melt butter over low heat in 1-quart saucepan; stir in flour. Add asparagus liquid and milk mixture. Cook and stir constantly until thickened; remove from heat. Add cheese; stir until melted. Meanwhile heat drained asparagus in 8-inch covered skillet over very low heat; add a teaspoon or so of water if necessary. Pour hot cheese sauce over drained hot asparagus; sprinkle with paprika. Makes 4 servings.
