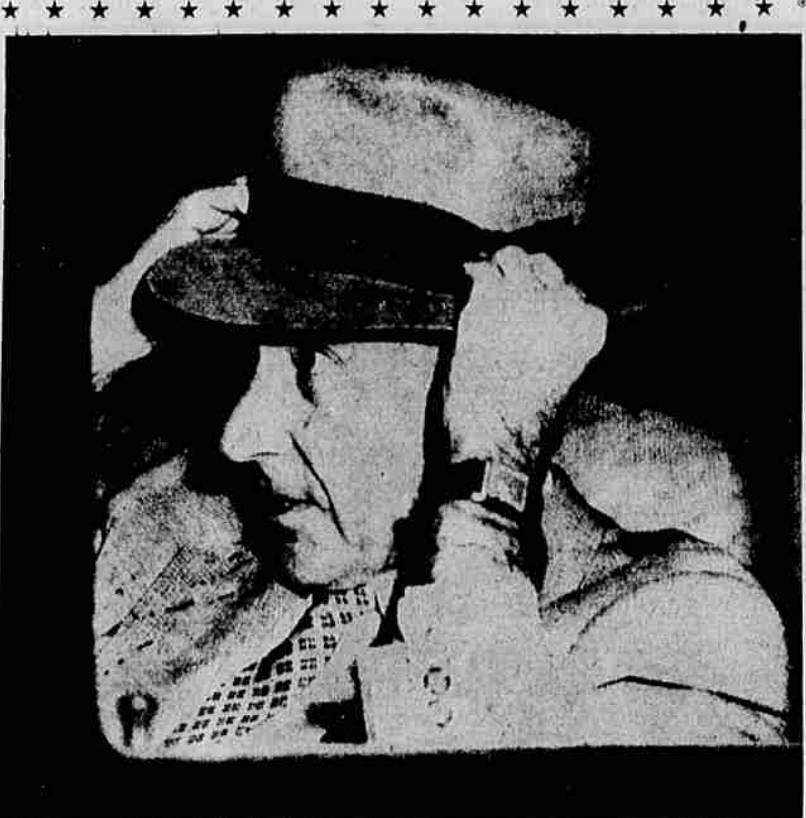

House Approves Last Bills of Tax Package, Key Compromise

By PAUL W. HARVEY Jr., Associated Press Writer. The Senate Taxation Committee went to work Friday on the House tax program, with signs that the bills are headed for stormy going.

The House gave its approval Thursday to the last three bills of the package, and it then promised to vote 43-6 for the compromise key district plan to redistribute basic school funds to local districts.

The House passed, with 11 dissenting votes, a bill to issue \$12,600,000 worth of bonds to modernize the Oregon Coast Highway between Gold Beach and Brookings.

The bill goes to the Senate, which already had approved another bill to do the same thing. In a move intended to reduce Oregon's high divorce rate, the House passed a Senate bill to provide for a 60-day waiting period between the filing of a divorce suit and the court hearing on the matter. This is intended to be a deterrent to divorce.

Senate Unit OKs Fair Control Move

The Senate Agriculture Committee voted 5-4 Thursday to recommend passage of a bill that would place the state Fair Commission under the Department of Agriculture.

The board now is an independent agency, but its members are appointed by the Governor. The deciding vote in the committee Thursday was cast by Sen. Francis Ziegler (R), Corvallis. He had announced recently that he was undecided how to ballot, holding up action on the proposal.

The bill was introduced by Sen. Dwight H. Hopkins (D), Imbler, but he recently said he was withdrawing his active support. Hopkins voted with the majority, however.

Voting with Ziegler and Hopkins were Sens. Musa, Naterlin and Sweetland. The four dissenters were Sens. Chase, Quiring, Leth and Cameron.

Nicaragua Exults as Somoza Tells Defeat Of Honduran Attack

By RICHARD G. MASSOCK. MANAGUA, Nicaragua — President Luis Somoza told a cheering throng of 15,000 Nicaraguans last night that a tiny Nicaraguan force had wrested the border town of Mocoron from a Honduran garrison five times its size.

As the crowd exulted, the President's brother, Gen. Anastasio Somoza Jr., shouted that the Nicaraguan flag is flying over the American settlement on Central America's Caribbean coast. The two countries have disputed the border for years.

Nicaraguan and Honduran accounts of the border dispute varied. Each country insisted that Mocoron was traditionally theirs. A Nicaraguan national guard unit reportedly occupied the town two weeks ago and Honduran troops took it back Wednesday.

In Teaciguapa, the Honduran capital, the ruling military junta ordered a blackout on any dispatches about military operations except official announcements. Ground and air clashes between Honduran and Nicaraguan forces were reported yesterday. The junta issued this communique last night.

"It is emphatically denied that the Honduran air force has been defeated or has suffered damage as has been affirmed by Nicaraguan publicity organs. The forces are standing firm, and ready to repel any aggression against our territorial integrity."

The Honduran government ordered all men between 18 and 32 to register for possible military service.

In Washington, the council of Organization of American States (OAS) voted unanimously to send a fact-finding mission to the area. It also called on the western hemisphere's foreign ministers to consult on the situation.

It has to go back to the House, though, because the Senate tacked on an amendment that also would have the committee investigate whether boards and commissions are issuing rules and regulations contrary to law.

The committee would consist of three representatives, two senators, and four persons appointed by the Governor.

They're Driving Me to Socialism, Says HST

By DOUGLAS B. CORNELL. WASHINGTON — Former President Harry S. Truman declared Friday the Eisenhower administration is driving him toward socialism with policies he said are raising interest rates on home owners and forcing the little fellow out of business.

"I'm not a Socialist," Truman said, "but they're driving me that way."

Speaking in his old give-embell style to the Electric Consumers Information Committee, the former chief executive said the most dangerous thing facing the country today is what he termed an administration objective to "turn the 18 billion or 20 billion dollars of the taxpayers' money that developed the atomic energy program over to private ownership."

When the atom is developed fully, Truman said, it can be the source of all the world's power and bring about the development of great desert areas.

"But," he went on, "if it is developed like the secretary of the treasury has controlled money they will choke it to death and half the people will starve."

"You ought not to get me started on it. I'm all steamed up."

Truman had some prepared remarks for the committee, an organization set up by labor and farm groups and electric cooperatives fighting for public power development. But he tossed most of them away.

Switching his fire to Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey, Truman said Humphrey "wants to choke us to death with interest rates."

The raising of interest rates, Truman commented, "is just an effort to put labor in its place. Well, labor's place is in the sun."

Various spokesmen for the Electric Consumers Information Committee urged the former President to "start slugging again" in the battle for public power. Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.), who at-

tended the breakfast meeting, called Truman the greatest fighter in protecting the resources of the people. Sen. George Norris, the late senator from Nebraska who was father of the TVA.

Truman hit hard at the administration's power policies in his prepared remarks. He told his audience that the administration's partnership development plan means the private electric company gets the powerhouse and dam and the government gets the fishholder and "they'll be charging the fish toll to get up that ladder."

Truman described the administration's Hells Canyon program as an "outrageous" giveaway that "would plunder the great natural resources that belong to the people."

Hells Canyon has been the center of a long, hot dispute over whether the government should build a single high dam or the Idaho Power Co. should build three smaller dams on the Snake River between Oregon and Idaho.

The Federal Power Commission authorized the power company to go ahead and the decision was upheld by the Supreme Court, but the fight still is going on in Congress. Now the administration has authorized a rapid tax writeoff for two of the private dams, under a drum fire of protest.

Truman said it was "outrageous" for the administration to turn over to the Idaho Power Co. the Hells Canyon dam site—the greatest and most valuable dam site remaining in America."
