Warren H. Dowling, Portland, will speak on "Glorious for the Home Garden" and Jan de Grand, Gresham, hybridizer, on "Lilies For the Home Garden."

The Thursday, June 13 session will include talks by Claude J. Senn, Portland, on "What to Look for in the Rhododendron," Ted Gedee and P. H. "Jack" Ryerson, Salem, "The Exbury Rhododendrons and Azaleas."

The concluding feature of the convention will be the Thursday evening banquet when Dr. John H. Haney, Seattle, will speak on "Is Gardening for Everyone?"

Garden Work Aided By Latest Devices

Mechanical Tools Eliminate Much of Home Ground Labor

The advances in mechanical devices to aid the home gardener have eliminated much of the labor formerly involved in maintaining the home grounds. Manufacturers of power equipment have developed machinery compact, efficient and inexpensive so that the average home owner can enjoy the advantages of more efficient home grounds maintenance without the expenditure of great physical effort or a great capital outlay.

Most noteworthy, and popular with the home gardener is the power mower. There are many of these on the market, ranging in price from \$50 for small rotary mowers to \$300 for large riding mowers.

RANGE OF TYPES

Types range from rotary mowers of various sizes that cut all grass and weeds at uniform height, some even chopping up the cut grass as fine as match sticks, to the lawn mower with power added. Such lawn mowers can be used to cut tall grass and even small bushes, laying it evenly though cut with a hand scythe.

Tilling, plowing and cultivating by hand is nearly a thing of the past, with many small, efficient garden tractors available at less than \$150. Attachments for most of these small garden tractors are available that provide power spraying, where a few trees are on the place and need to be cared for. Tiller blades are standard equipment with the larger garden tractors, enabling the owner to move dirt and debris or level a given area.

Some tractors come with power take-off facilities that permit the machine to serve as the power house for operating saws, compressors for spraying, spray painting.

ELECTRIC HEDGE TRIMMER

For the home owner who has problems maintaining a hedge in trim, near appearance, the several fine electric hedge trimmers will prove a great addition to gardening tools. Most of these trim neatly and cleanly with a minimum of effort which adds greatly to the appearance of the home grounds yet require a minimum of effort.

Similarly there are some excellent lawn trimmers or edgers, that will trim lawn grass right up to trees, fences, walls and rocks where the regular mower will not reach. Tilled the trimmer becomes an effective edger, cutting a clean, neat groove between the walkway and lawn turf with efficient decisive action.

Weed Control Accomplished By Chemicals

Now is the time to start control of weeds in lawns.

Dandelions, broadleaf and buck daisies, plantain, bull thistle and chickweed can easily be killed by using 2,4-D, and chickweed, white clover and many other difficult to kill weeds can be controlled with 2,4-T or a mixture of 2,4-D and 2,4-T. Both, however, should be used with caution, for they are capable of killing many desirable broadleaf plants.

A few safety rules listed by County Agent Wilbur L. Bluhm in using the sprays are: do not spray in windy days; use at least three to four gallons of water per 1,000 square feet for good coverage; use low pressure to get a coarse spray rather than a finely atomized one; if possible use a protective cover over the spray boom, or hold a solid barrier between spray and flowers or shrubs when spraying; and do not spray young, tender, newly seeded lawns.

Weedy grasses, such as velvet grass and annual bluegrass, cannot be controlled with either 2,4-D or 2,4-T. A vigorous turf is very important in the control of these weeds, as well as all others. Proper mowing and fertilization encourage vigorous growth of the desirable lawn grasses.


