Nilsen Urges Tougher Labor Camp Control

PORTLAND (AP)—State Labor Commissioner Norman Nilsen today recommended a stiffening of standards for migrant labor camps in Oregon.

The recommendations to Gov. Robert Holmes followed an investigation last week into a Clackamas county situation after workers had been evicted and were cared for by welfare authorities.

Nilsen suggested that closer liaison should be maintained between states "so that people will not come to Oregon expecting to be employed when jobs are non-existent, only to become wards of the state of welfare agencies."

He also said he had talked with growers and suggested establishment of a "code of ethics which would include that all members comply with the labor, health and other laws pertaining to their operations."
