**cut the rate for manufacturing industries from 6 to 4 per cent.** Ohmart told the committee Democrats "you can pass this bill beauty and you take the onus for it."

**FAVOR SALES TAX** Ohmart and Lowry oppose higher income taxes on persons or corporations. They favor a sales tax.

Again demanding public hearings Ohmart said there are corporations that should be permitted to testify.

Sweetland replied that "many ordinary people would like to appear and they would speak loudly for the Democratic program. They are the ones who took the rap to them two years ago."

Lowry replied that the Democrats "don't even understand this tax problem. This committee is just staggering around in the dark."

Speaking on a provision boosting the excise tax on utilities from 4 to 7 per cent of income, Pearson said:

"You couldn't even give them a high enough rate if you made it 100 per cent."

**FUNDS APPROVED** The Joint Ways and Means Committee approved bills to appropriate \$830,000 for the proposed Oregon centennial celebration in Portland in 1959; and \$90,000 to support community junior colleges.

Partisanship also flared on the Senate floor as Republicans succeeded 16-14 in forcing a two-day delay in consideration of labor's bill to increase unemployment compensation benefits.

The Republicans, presenting a solid front, also got Sen. Harry Boivin (D), Klamath Falls, to vote with them.

The bill, which was to be considered Wednesday, was put over until Friday.

The motion to delay was made by Sen. Ohmart, who said he wanted more time to study the question.

Sen. Dimick replied that "this is a deliberate attempt to kill the bill for this session, because the Legislature is almost over."

against a desirable 75. It could be remedied at a cost of \$6,440. This item, too, was held in abeyance pending final determination of the budget.

The committee approved a request of Sheriff Denver Young for an increase of three men in his staff of deputies and passed on to the balance of the crew a salary raise of \$25 a month.

Dr. W. J. Stone, head of the Marion County Department of Health was authorized to make salary adjustments among members of his staff in accordance with the merit system that exists.

The director of the juvenile department was given a salary boost of \$1,000, while Judge Joseph B. Felton was authorized to increase the staff by one counselor and a secretary.

Since nothing has been done by the legislature concerning a move to have the state provide greater financial assistance to district attorney's offices, the budget committee postponed until Thursday morning Hattie Bratzel's request for increases in salaries and personnel.

thoroughly with Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey that the law granting quick tax write-offs should be revised to limit such benefits to companies dealing directly with the national defense and possibly to some small business enterprises.

Eisenhower said the defense items in his budget represent stupendous sums. He added that the country ought to aim toward big savings that can be effected, when international tensions are eased.

Meantime, he went on, expenditures for the departments which are working for world peace, such as the State Department and the International Cooperation Administration which administers foreign aid, ought not to be cut.

Eisenhower said he is working on two talks he expects to give to the nation on television and radio. One of these will be made soon, he said, but the timing of the other has not been fixed.

In one of these, presumably the first, Eisenhower said he plans to explain to the people what his budget is and what it means.

He said everybody seems to be for cutting the budget for everybody else's projects.
