### EVERYDAY COOKIES

Ingredients: 1 cup sifted flour, 1 teaspoon double-acting baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup quick-cooking rolled oats, 1/2 pound (1/2 cup) margarine, 1/2 cup smooth-style peanut butter, 1 cup firmly-packed dark brown sugar, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup seedless raisins (rinsed in hot water and drained), 1/4 cup snipped pitted dates.

Method: Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt; stir in rolled oats. Cream margarine, peanut butter and brown sugar; beat in eggs thoroughly, one at a time. Add flour mixture; mix well. Mix raisins and dates. Drop mixture, a tablespoon at a time, a couple of inches apart, on greased baking sheets. Bake in moderate (350 degrees) oven 12 to 15 minutes or until lightly browned. (Cookies spread and will be crisp when cooled). Cool on racks; store in tightly covered container. Makes about 4 dozen.
