the whole front corner of the house. "I was pretty shaken, too," she said. Fortunately, the huge fell across the lawn and street, missing the house.

Robert Tom, a forestry technician, counted the rings in the trunk and determined the age of the tree to be about fifty years. The reason it fell, according to Jack Fiala, facilities manager, is that the roots were too short.

Crews were busy, Monday and Tuesday, removing other fallen trees, branches, and limbs from street and roads around Warm Springs. Numerous truck loads were hauled to the dump in the wake of the freak wind storm.

Gusts were reported to be between 40 and 65 miles per hour from 2:45 to 3:45 p.m. on Monday. At 4:00, Helena Shike read off the wind velocity meter at Warm Springs a recording of a strong and steady wind of 26 to 27 miles per hour.

Although lights flickered occasionally Monday afternoon, Pacific Power and Light reported no power outages in either Warm Springs or the Madras area.
