DEDICATION COMES ON THE 12th ANNIVERSARY

**Dedication of the New 55-Rooms at the Kah-Nee-Ta Lodge with Congressman
Al Ullman was held Sunday, May 30**

A large crowd of dignitaries, guests, tribal members, television crews and press people observed the ribbon-cutting ceremony dedicating the new 55-room wing at Kah-Nee-Ta Lodge Sunday, May 30. Congressman Al Ullman and Sarah Greene (Miss Warm Springs), and a host of honored guests participated in the 11 a.m. ceremony.

The keynote address was delivered by Ken Smith, General Manager of the Confederated Tribes. He pointed out that this dedication came on the 12th anniversary of the resort which opened with Kah-Nee-Ta Village on Memorial Day of 1964.

The theme of his speech traced the history of the resort beginning with the dream of the late Vernon Jackson. He followed the realization of that dream through the first two phases of the development of Kah-Nee-Ta to the present day with an optimistic look to the future of the resort.

After introductions of Paiute Chief Nick Kalama, Wasco Chief Nelson Wallulatam, and Warm Springs Chief Amos Simtustus, Congressman Al Ullman spoke. He complimented the Tribes on their accomplishments and their good leadership through the years.

Mark Smith, EDA western

regional director, echoed Ullman's remarks adding that, in his opinion, "the Warm Springs Reservation is the best run, most efficiently managed reservation in the nation."

Before the official ribbon-cutting, Sarah Greene offered a song of prayer. She wore the ceremonial buckskin dress beaded by her great-great-grandmother. She was escorted by Bill Katchia, also in ceremonial dress.

The red, white and blue streamers were officially cut by Miss Warm Springs with the aid of Ken Smith, Congressman Ullman, Mark Smith of EDA, and the three Tribal Chiefs. Also on hand were Dan Myles (Kah-Nee-Ta manager), Ed Manion (enterprise manager), and Olney Patt, Sr.

Following the formal ribbon-cutting ceremonies, there was a special luncheon in the Lodge. Matilda Mitchell gave the invocation preceding the luncheon with tradition prayer, and also made the closing remarks at the luncheon, giving the benediction in Sahaptan.

Mrs. Louis Jackson was one of the honored guests at the luncheon. Some of the others included Congressman Ullman, Ken Smith, Miss Warm Springs, the Tribal Chiefs, Mark Smith, Representa-

With the completion of the third expansion phase at Kah-Nee-Ta, the total rooms are now 144 at the lodge, with the capacity for meetings and conventions of up to 250 persons.

The golf course now boasts 18 holes, and the expansion also included saunas. The new wing follows the same lines of the lodge's first phase, with the red cedar exterior accenting the high desert surroundings of the lodge.

Indian Water Rights Discussed

The Water Board, at a meeting held on June 3, 1976, discussed matters regarding the Indian water rights here in the Northwest. One of the main concerns was the United States Geological Survey that has

been completed here on the reservation. They are now working on the next phase, which is the need and use of the waters here on the reservation.

Working closely with the Tribal Council, the W-B has been in contact with various

hydrologists on matters relating to the present need for utilizing the resource here on the reservation.

Studies should be made for the present mill site, the domestic use of water around the Warm Springs Area and for all other areas. It was suggested that a study be made for the Simnasho area water supply which needs immediate attention for domestic use and for fire protection.

This is just a short summary of concerns by the Water Board.
