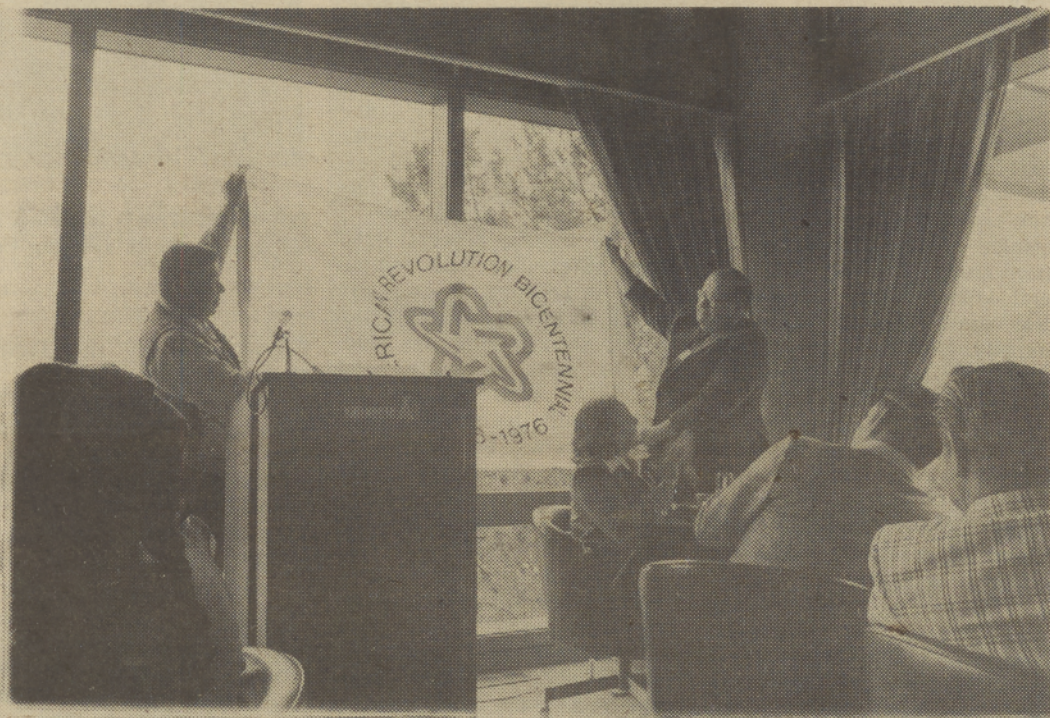

Administration Center Underway

Construction of the Tribal Administrative Center has begun. The center should be completed by next winter, and occupants of the now-over-

crowded Administration Building will be able to move in by next Spring.

Eight bids for the new Administration Center construction project were received April 30. The low bidder was Chamber and Associates of Eugene and Bend. At a pre-construction conference on May 18, the low bid of \$1,091,000 was approved with

construction scheduled to begin May 25th. Completion of the center should take about ten months.

The new Tribal Administrative Center, approved by a tribal referendum vote Thursday, August 28, 1975, is fi-

nanced by a low interest loan (5 percent) for \$1,500,000 through Farmers Home Administration.

The reason for a new Administrative Center is quite apparent when one enters the

existing building. Not only is there a lack of office space and overcrowding, but departments are spread out all over Warm Springs and throughout the campus area.

Continued growth of tribal programs and federal grants require additional space. Several departments are already over crowded which decreases efficiency and service to Tribal Members. In addition, it is felt that a new Administrative Center will improve communication among departments and with the community.

The following departments will be relocated in the new 26,000 square foot Administration Center: credit, vital statistics, education, steno pool, Council Chambers, real property, personnel, social work, health services, data processing, purchasing, plant management, housing, planning, Tribal Administration, BIA administration, accounting, and IIM.

Thursday, June 10th, Maxine Clements, Edith Danzuka, Juanita Bourland, and Rita Squiemphen went to the architect's office in Portland to look over fabric samples and to make suggestions for the drapes and interior decorating.

Tribal employees, who now sit practically shoulder to shoulder, seem elated at the prospect of a little more elbow room next Spring.
