

Fry Bread Tourney - June 26-27

Kah-Nee-Ta Golf Pro Jim Wilkinson has indicated that the field is filling out for the 7th Annual Fry Bread Golf Tournament, to be held at the Kah-Nee-Ta Golf Course this weekend.

The major difference between this tournament and those in the past is that this will be the first time the field of competitors will play a full eighteen holes. (The new nine was not ready for last year's tourney).

104 Competitors have signed up for the two day, 36 hole tournament thus far, according to Tournament official Cecil "Melvin" Connors. Entrants include natives of Oregon,

Washington, California, Idaho, Nevada, and one player coming all the way from Arizona to compete.

Play will begin at 8:30 Saturday morning with a shotgun start (simultaneous tee-off times at different holes). Various par-three holes will be chosen for the K-P competition, and two par-five holes for the long drive competition. The day will end with a banquet for players and guests, which will start at 6:30 p.m.

Sunday will decide the winners of the low net and low gross competition. Merchandise certificates and trophies will be awarded to the winners in those categories.

Treaty Days Rodeo

There will be something for everyone this weekend as Pi-Ume-Sha draws crowds of enthusiastic people to the reservation. While the dancing is going on, rodeo fans will be gathering at the arena for the Fourth Annual Warm Springs All-Indian Rodeo, to be held Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

The rodeo will be presented by the Warm Springs Rodeo Association and is sanctioned by the Western States Indian Rodeo Association. The judges must be WSIRA members; one will be selected by the Committee and one will be selected by contestants. Participants in the rodeo must be either

WSIRA members or local residents.

The major competitive events for which silver buckles will be awarded will be: saddle bronc, bareback, bull riding, calf roping, wild cow milking, team roping (2 buckles), and barrel racing. Points earned from these events will be

totaled with all other accumulated scores at the end of the summer. The ten contestants with the highest point total in each event will be entitled to compete in the Western States Indian Rodeo Finals, to be held at a site not yet selected.

Bulls will be provided by Glen Condon and wild horses will come from the Warm

Springs Reservation.

There will be just one go in the riding events and wild cow milking, but two in roping events. Re-rides will be determined by the judges.

A rabbit scramble will be staged for kids 12 and under, and the Wild Horse Race for which there is also a silver buckle award will entertain crowds at the end of the program.

Regular scheduled events will begin at 1:00 p.m. each day.

Slack time will be Sunday morning at 9:00. Admission is \$2.50 for adults, \$1.50 for 16 and under, and free for pre-schoolers.

Gun Show at H.S.

The Round Butte Rifle and Pistol Club will present the annual, original Silver Buckle Gun Show at the Madras High School cafeteria July 3, 4, and 5.

On display will be guns, coins, knives, antiques and Indian artifacts for people to buy, sell, trade, display, or to just look.

24 hour security will be provided at the gun show where individuals may rent trade tables for \$12.50 for the three days. Display tables cost \$7.50 for 3 days and one free dinner is included with each table rental.

Awards (silver belt buckles) will be given for eight

category awards, one best of show, five judges choice, and one America 1776-1976.

Other activities planned are a western dance, a rock-hound pow-wow, and Indian fireworks. It is reported that there will be lots of food and lots of fun.

Hours are 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday and from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Monday. Admission is .75 cents per person with no charge for children under 12 when accompanied by a parent.
