Commission Seeks Coordination

The Commission on Indian Services asked Governor Straub and Attorney General Johnson for their assistance in coordinating requests to state agencies for information about Indians in Oregon. The Commission also offered its assistance to all state agencies in assuring that accurate information is available on issues affecting Indians in the state.

According to Warren "Rudy" Clements, Chairman of the Commission on Indian Services: "The Commission is concerned that state agencies may be making recommendations on significant issues without complete or accurate information and without consulting with the Indian people to be affected. By working with the Governor and the Attorney General, the Commission hopes to establish an opportunity for Indian communities to address issues which affect them and to provide the information state agencies require."

Of particular concern to the Commission is a questionnaire recently prepared by the Oregon Department of Revenue for the Western States Association of Tax Administrators concerning state taxation of Indian lands. The questionnaire was designed to form the basis for recommendations to the American Indian Policy Review Commission in Washington, D.C. Among the issues included in the questionnaire were: 1) the accessibility of Indian reservations to urban

centers; 2) the effects of past federal policies on termination and assimilation; 3) special treaty right or natural resource management problems; 4) the effects of granting the state jurisdiction over certain Indian lands pursuant to P.L. 83-280 and the likelihood of the state returning jurisdiction to the federal government; 5) taxing jurisdiction problems; 6) the relationship of tribal governments to other units of government; 7) the potential for developing a tax base for reservations in the state; 8) the existence of special state services for Indians; and 9) the impact of "tax-exempt" status for Indians.

At press time the Commission had received a letter of support from the Governor in response to its request for assistance. This is felt to be an important step toward fulfillment of the Commission's role of working with the state government, and more specifically with the Department of Revenue.

The Commission on Indian Services was created by statute in 1975. The ten-member Commission — composed of two legislators and eight Indians representing tribes or communities throughout the state — was established to coordinate information about Indian communities in Oregon and to develop recommendations for improving services affecting Indians.

Control of Cattle Grubs

Now is the time to treat cattle for grubs. A number of pour-on give excellent control and are fairly inexpensive. Thirty adult cows can be treated for 12-15 dollars.

With pour-on the livestock own simple pours the insecticide on the back of the animal. Pour-ons can be obtained in Madras where animal medicines are sold.

Cattle grubs probably cause greater loss than any other pest of cattle. Besides damaging meat and hides by their burrowing they lower beef cattle gains and cow milk production.

Family and Consumer Economics

New FTC Rule Protects Mail Order Customers

Under a new Federal Trade Commission rule, if you have sent your payment for the merchandise along with a mail order to a company, you can be sure of getting your goods within 30 days, or the time designated in the ad, or the company must refund your money, according to Debra Slater, Oregon State University Extension family and con-

sumer economics Specialist.

If a company cannot ship your order within the time limit specified in its advertisement, it must notify you of the delay and request your consent to the delay or refund your money.

Consumers should respond when they receive such notices from mail order companies, states Ms. Slater, or the company may presume that they have consented to the delay in delivery. If you request a refund, the mail order company must make the refund within seven days or your demand, and it cannot limit your refund to a credit on merchandise only.

Consumers who feel that their rights under this FTC rule have been abused should contact the Consumer Services Division in Salem or write directly to the FTC, Bureau of Consumer Protection, Washington, DC 20580.

New Director Selected

Lester Robbins, a Yakima Indian and Redmond resident, has been selected as the new director for the Central Oregon Community College Native American program, according to COCC president Dr. Frederick Boyle.

Robbins, 46, will succeed Wayne Johnson, who left the position in June to begin doctoral studies at Stanford University.

Robbins will be responsible for the direction of the College's existing Native American programs both at the College and on the Warm Springs reservations, Boyle said.

Prior to accepting the College position, Robbins held numerous positions including that of manpower planner for the state of Oregon, executive director of Klamath Indian social service agency, and business manager of the Quileute Indian tribe in La Push, Wa. His career also included more than 20 years as a design consultant for Boeing Aircraft Corp. in Renton, Wa.
