Phyllis Many Wounds Johnson has returned to her hometown in South Dakota. Known to many as the secretary in the BIA Education Department, Phyllis left her job of three years in order to be closer to her roots.

She and her husband Ron are both from South Dakota and they will be living within easy driving distance of both

their hometowns.

Phyllis was offered a job in the Personnel Department of the Aberdeen Area Office (BIA). It took the Johnsons less than a week to make up their minds to go, then to pack and actually be gone.

It's not that they didn't enjoy their stay in Warm Springs . . . but you know the appeal of "home."

For the first time ever, Warm Springs will be visited by the Moderator of the 188th General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church. Dr. Thelma Adair, who is the highest elective officer of the 2.7 million-member denomination, will be in Warm Springs Monday, November 1 to meet with tribal officials and the community-at-large.

Warm Springs is one of four stops Dr. Adair will be making in Oregon. She will meet with General Manager Ken Smith, the Tribal Council and key Tribal officials.

In the afternoon a reception will be held at the Presbyterian Church to which all are invited. Dr. Adair will give a brief presentation and answer questions people might have at this 2:00 o'clock reception. On display will be items of cultural and historical value assembled by members of the local church.

Dr. Adair is professor of education at Queens College in the City University of New York. She has a rich background in the field of education and holds an M.A. and Ph.D. in education from Columbia University Teachers College.

Dr. Adair has served on a variety of committees and boards including the denomination's Board of Christian Education, the Special Committee on the Needs and

Rights of children, and black Presbyterians United, of which she is currently president.

Dr. Adair's husband, the Rev. A. Eugene Adair, is pastor of the Mt. Morris Presbyterian Church in New York City where she is a ruling elder.

Her extensive involvement with the Presbyterian Church, including the high position she now holds, make her an especially fine representative of the church. "She symbolizes the total Church," says the Rev. Cal Chinn, who will be hosting Dr. Adair here in Warm Springs.

"Dr. Adair likes to get out and listen to the grass roots,"

said Rev. Chinn. "Her visit here is indicative of the Presbyterian Church's commitment to the American Indian."

The General Assembly has an 8-10 day session each year after which the Moderator tours the country to talk with and listen to people. Dr. Adair was elected to her one-year term at last winter's Assembly in Maryland, which was attended by local Church member Joann Smith. Joann was a commissioner who voted in the election.

Dr. Adair is a dynamic speaker and an interesting individual. Rev. Chinn expects that she will offer valuable insights on the influence of the Presbyterian Church throughout the country as well as the direction in which the Church is moving.

Come and meet Dr. Adair at the 2:00 reception at the Warm Springs Presbyterian Church Monday, November 1. She will enjoy hearing from you as much as you will enjoy her visit.

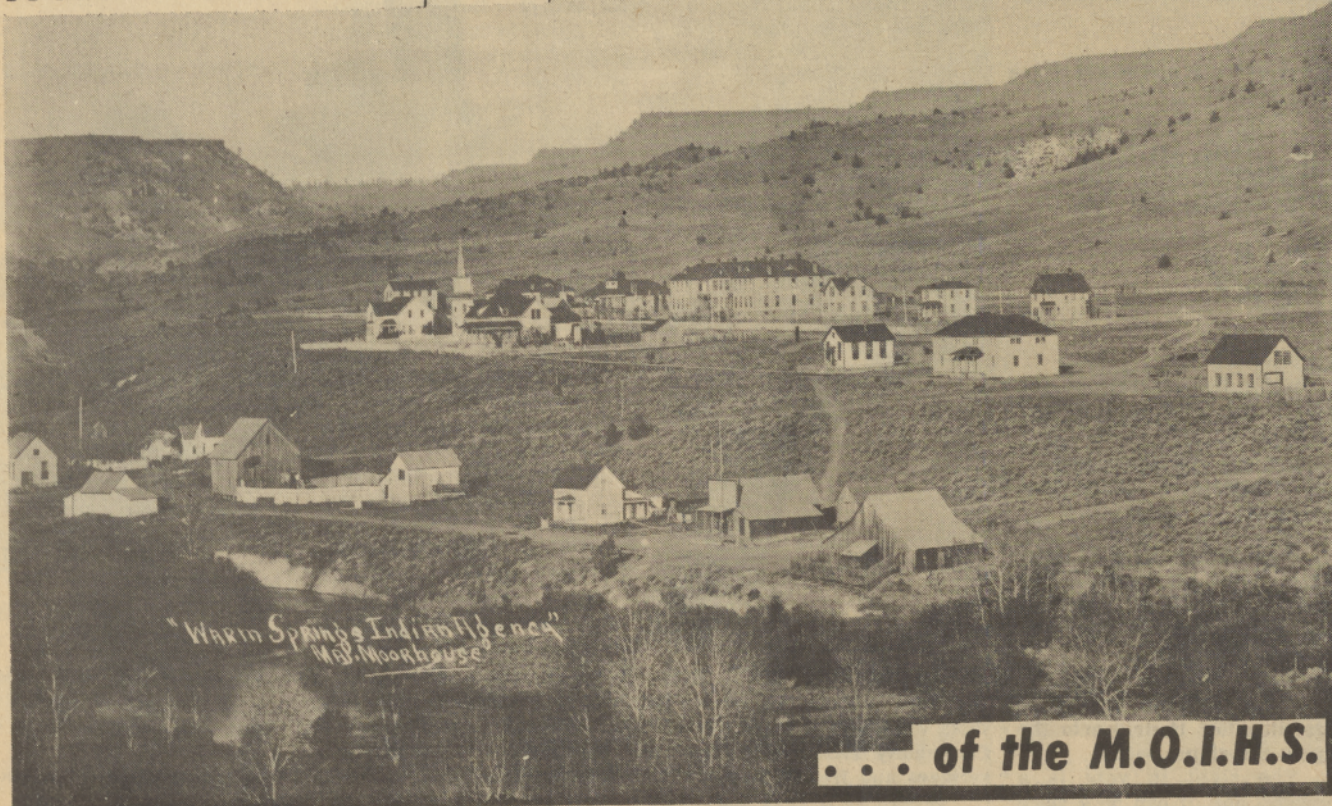
