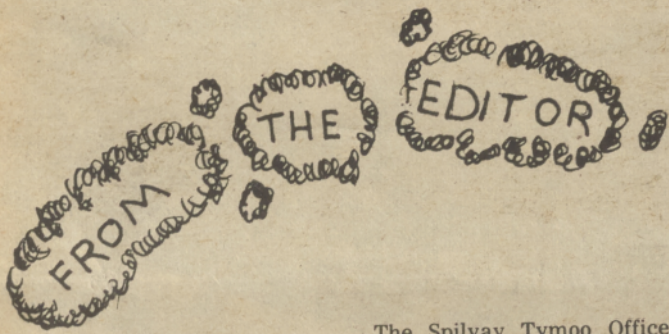

Original Smokey Bear Dies

In 1950, a badly burned bear cub was found clinging to a charred tree in the wake of a forest fire which swept through part of the Lincoln National Forest. He was treated for burns and was flown to Santa Fe, New Mexico for further treatment and was gradually nursed back to health. Later he became known as Smokey Bear.

Smokey, who in June of 1950 was elected as the first living symbol of forest fire prevention, died last Monday, November 8, in Washington, D.C. in the National Zoo. As the original Smokey Bear, he was named in the first National campaign for the prevention of forest fires which originated in 1942.

Smokey retired in May 1975 after 25 years of service and was replaced by another, younger Smokey. According to the Agriculture Department, the new Smokey Bear has a similar background, as he was also found in the Lincoln National Forest. The new cub was abandoned and half-starved, though he had not suffered the severe burns that the original Smokey had.

Officials said the old Smokey died "in his retirement cage" at the zoo. Two years ago, Congress specified that the bear's remains be shipped to Capitan, New Mexico where burial is to take place at the Smokey Bear Historical Park there.
