LEGAL NOTICE

Public Notice
November 26, 1976
Re: "Greenville" and "Old Trailer Court"

Notice of finding of no significant effect on the environment and notice of release of Community Development funds for Warm Springs "Greenville" housing clearance project and "Hollywood" clearance project completion.

Notice is hereby given that the environmental assessment of the Warm Springs housing clearance project revealed no over-riding adverse impacts and that no significant effect on the environment would result from the implementation of the proposed Warm Springs "Hollywood" project. The environmental assessment for the area was based on the following conditions: 1. the project conforms to local comprehensive plan, zoning and all applicable standards; 2. the project would not affect wildlife, agricultural production or mineral resources; 3. the project would not impact local services, facilities or utilities and; 4. geologic and other physical characteristics of the site would not be impacted.

Possible project modifications and alternatives were not considered because no adverse environmental impacts were identified. The only potential adverse environmental impact would be short term - if the structures are burned during demolition. Demolition would be supervised by local fire department personnel.

No further environmental review of the project is proposed to be conducted and the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon intend to request HUD to release funds designated for the Warm Springs Project.

Anyone interested in the environmental assessment of the project is invited to submit their comments to the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon on or before December 20, 1976.

Also, Notice is hereby given that the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation, pursuant to Section 104 of Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, will submit a "Request for Release of Funds and Certification" to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development

on the 6th day of December, 1976. Said request is for \$10,000, granted under Community Development Block Grant No. B-76-DN-41-0014, authorized under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974.

The subject is authorized for acquisition and demolition of structures in the Warm Springs "Greenville" and "Hollywood" subdivisions, and relocation of persons now living within the subject areas to suitable housing, in conformance with Federal Acquisition and Relocation Laws.

The Confederated Tribes of the Warm Spring Reservation have prepared an Environmental Review of the subject project, dated September 28, 1976. Said document is available for public review at the office of the General Manager, Tribal Administration Building, Warm Springs, Oregon, Monday through Friday between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Copies of said document are available to the public upon request.

In the matter of the subject project, the applicant is the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon, Administration Building, Warm Springs, Oregon 97761, and the Chief Executive Officer is Ken Smith, General Manager and Treasurer of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, Warm Springs, Oregon 97761.

The Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon will undertake the project described above with Block Grant funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs are certifying to HUD

that the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs and Ken Smith, in his official capacity as General Manager and Secretary-Treasurer, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision making, and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs may use the Block Grant Funds, and HUD will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

HUD will accept an objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is on one of the following bases: (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the Chief Executive Officer of the applicant; or (b) that the applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision, finding or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process.

Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58), and may be addressed to HUD at the Portland Area Office, 520 S.W. 6th Avenue, Portland, Oregon 97204. Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD. No objection received after December 17, 1976 will be considered by HUD.

Some Employees won't hire

Some employers will not hire people unless they have a Social Security number, so students and others planning to get holiday jobs should apply for a number without delay if they do not already have one, according to John Fullerton, Social Security representative in Central Oregon.

"When you don't recall having had a Social Security number before," Fullerton said, "your application is screened against central files in Baltimore to make sure a second number is not issued to you — and screening takes time."

"You should apply for your Social Security number at least several weeks before you need it for a job," he said. "You can get information about applying by calling or writing the Social Security office in Bend."

People build disability, survivors, retirement, and Medicare protection by work and earnings credited to their Social Security number. Workers get credit if they are paid \$50 or more in a 3-month calendar quarter for work covered by Social Security.

More than nine out of 10 jobs are covered by Social Security.

"Your Social Security number is yours alone and remains the same for life," Fullerton said. "When you get a job covered by Social Security, be sure your employer copies your name and number correctly from your Social Security card to his record."

People applying for a Social Security number for the first time may be asked to prove their age, identity, and citizenship, according to Fullerton.

Arizona Tribe Gets EDA Grant

Approval of a \$32,000 grant to conduct a program of planning for long-range economic development and new jobs on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation in Arizona was announced.

The White Mountain Apache Tribe, with offices at Whiteriver, applied for the grant from the Economic Development Administration, U.S. Department of Commerce.

The funds will be used for a staff to prepare and administer a program of long-range business and industrial growth for the reservation.

Tribal leaders are working to develop local resources for new job opportunities. They have arranged skill-training Programs in an effort to attract industry. Planning studies are under way to develop small business for Indian ownership and to create additional community centers.

The reservation will review plans for tourist facilities and year-round recreation activities.

The EDA grant will meet the total cost of the program through September 30, 1977.
