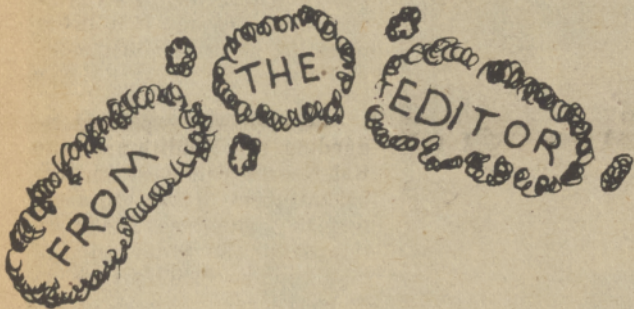

Lets use our right to an education

An Open letter to the People of Warm Springs

Being Indian is good, being Indian is beautiful and I respect the fact that I have Indian blood. But it takes a lot more than that to survive in today's environment as a person. We must first accomplish self respect, self confidence, self control and respect for others.

Working at the Madras Junior High School this year I have been able to see that most of the faculty here is trying to assist our students from Warm Springs as well as other students, along with the concern, support, love from home and the helpful support from our tribal educators.

I guess we as parents sometimes need to ask ourselves, what do we want our kids to accomplish? Should we tell them? Should we ask them? Or should we communicate together and decide on a goal?

Well I know that most every parent or guardian would like what's best for those that we love.

Do you feel that our Indian students should have the same rights to equal education as the White students? The Warm Springs students do have that right — but to get a worthwhile education the students need to be present at the school — be respectful to themselves, other students, and teachers and should also then expect the same treatment in return.

This is what I see Mr. Sebastian along with many other educators trying to accomplish. This is why the Oregon State law and District policies are being initiated at the M.J.H.S. Truancy and discipline is a problem with some students from Warm Springs. So let's encourage our children to do the best job they can, so

we may be proud of what they can do if they try harder. We may have some strong leaders in the future to be able to help their people, each other and others.

It's very important that each of you as concerned parents or guardians write an excuse or phone the schools when your child is absent or tardy, this is necessary for all students.

Since I have been working as a Community Liaison I have been asked about concerns regarding prejudice in the school. As far as I know students are disciplined to the same type of procedure, and attendance is all handled as fair as possible — I as a person, cannot say that the schools are prejudiced, because I'm not that sure what that means to each of us individually.
