Holiday All Indian Bowling Tournament

THE WARM SPRINGS ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION will hold the Warm Springs all-Indian Bowling tournament with men and womens handicap on Dec. 31, to Jan. 2, ABC sanctioned.

The entries opened Nov. 22, and will close Dec. 25th. The highest league average as of Dec. 1 will be used and this will include last years league average (1975-76). Participants must be 1/2 Indian decent with documentation on hand and also must be a member of ABC-WIBC. The handicap will be based on 70 percent of 200 on scratch basis (men and women). Each bowler shall be responsible to verify his average. Anyone that has not bowled 30 games in league play in the past two seasons must bowl scratch. All prize fees including holiday champ bowl-off will be returned 100 percent,

also prizes will be awarded on a handicap basis (exception of holiday camp bowl-off will be on scratch basis) all winners average will be verified by tournament committee before play-off. All teams will bowl in one class (men and women).

Doubles Men: Division I, 42 and under handicap.

Combined: Division II, 43 and over handicap combined. Women Division I, 70 and under handicap. Combined: Division II, 71 and over handicap combined.

Anyone who fails to report his correct average can be disqualified, the tournament committee reserves the right of final decision on all squad times.

The tournament will follow all ABC-WIBA rules for starting teams. The prize ration be as follows.
