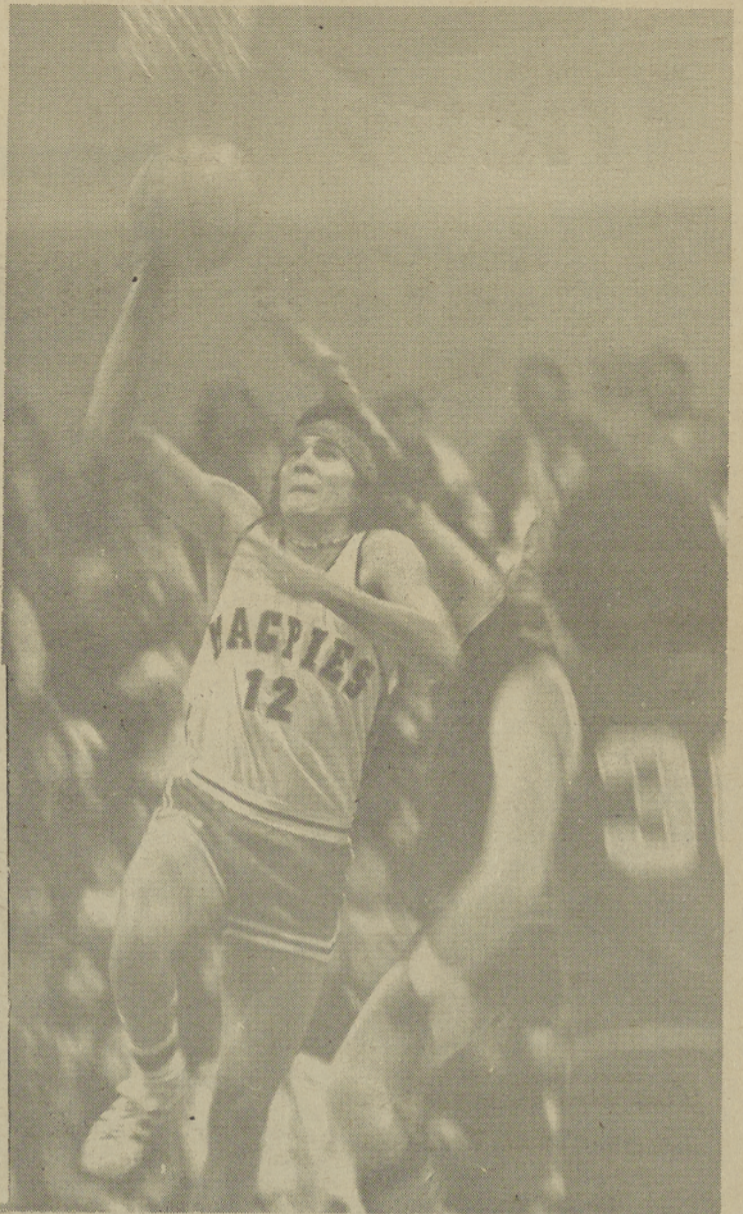
Sixth graders to eye Jr. High

In the past, the Warm Springs sixth grade students have had one complete day as an entire sixth grade class, to visit the Madras Junior High School. This has not accomplished as much as would have been hoped, according to Community Liaison Marie Calica. This year, the plan is to have the sixth grade students visit in four groups of four, with a seventh grade student as their host or hostess. This will afford the opportunity to complete a full-day student schedule.

This visitation would allow the grade school students the opportunity to become pre-oriented to the Madras Junior High School's curriculum, teachers, other students, and many other things in the Junior High School's vicinity.

As of Wednesday, January 5, 1977, the sixth grade class will be visiting MJHS weekly until about March. Each sixth grade student will be picked up at the Warm Springs Elementary School by Jr. High Community Liaison in groups of four twice weekly until each student has had a turn. Students will return back to Warm Springs by school bus.

The Celilo Wyam Board: two Boardmembers from each reservation are; Olney Patt, Sr. and Amos Simustus from Warm Springs; Mike Ferrel and Clydel Bronson, Umatilla Roger Jim and Nelson Moses, Yakima; Wilfred Yallup and Karen Jim of Celilo; Adi Defender, Program Coordinator.

The newly established governing body of Celilo Village, is having a Communication workshop on January 27-28, 1977. The workshop theme "Native/Non-Native Communication, creating a Two-Way Flow". This is a threefold objective.

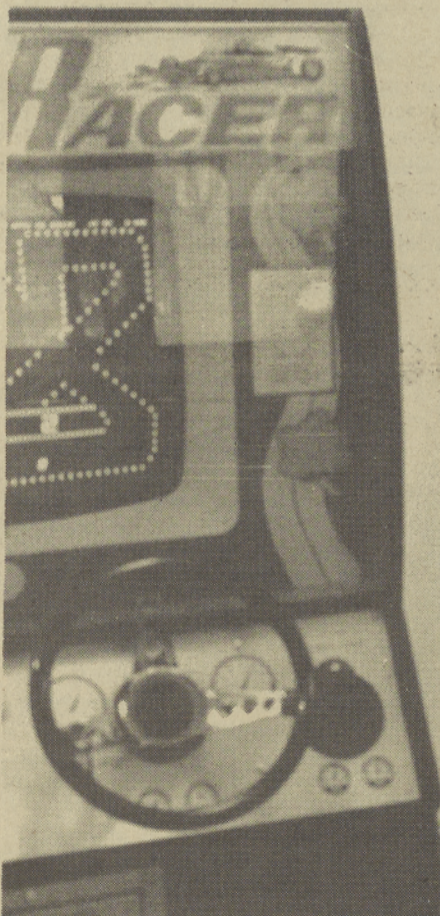
(1) To bring together Celilo people and all available service-rendering agency personnel to get to know each other better as individuals.

(2) To bring to all workshop participants a better understanding of the special relationships of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, U. S. Public

Health/Division of Indian Health, the Tribal Councils, and other local resource agencies to the Celilo people.

(3) To give the participants an opportunity to examine together "community development" — how people analyze their own situations, how they define what is needed and what their problems are; how they go about meeting these needs and solving the problems. And, how service-rendering agency personnel can work with the Celilo People in ways that will help the people work towards a more effective solution to their problems.

It has been the wishes of the Celilo People for several years to be recognized, and now a Board has been established with their sincere attempt to voice their needs to the local, State-Federal Agencies for their assistance to develop a better community.

Rabies shots Clinic set . . . required

Under the Tribal Dog Control Ordinance, all dogs on the reservation must be immunized against rabies. A rabies inoculation for dogs and cats will be held Saturday, January 15 at the Madras Veterinary Clinic on Highway 97 north of Madras.

Animals may receive shots between 1:30 and 4 p.m. Dogs should be brought on leashes and cats must be in containers. The cost of the immunization will be \$3 per animal.


Only animals four months of age or older can receive the inoculations. Cats should be immunized every year, but dogs over six months of age require the treatment only every three years.

Rabies certificates are necessary in order to obtain dog licenses. The Warm

Springs Public Health Service urges pet owners to comply with the Tribal Ordinance and protect their dogs...and cats... from the danger of rabies.
