This annual report is an attempt to let you, the Warm Springs Community know what we in Extension have done. We welcome comments on what we can do different or what we should be doing that were not.

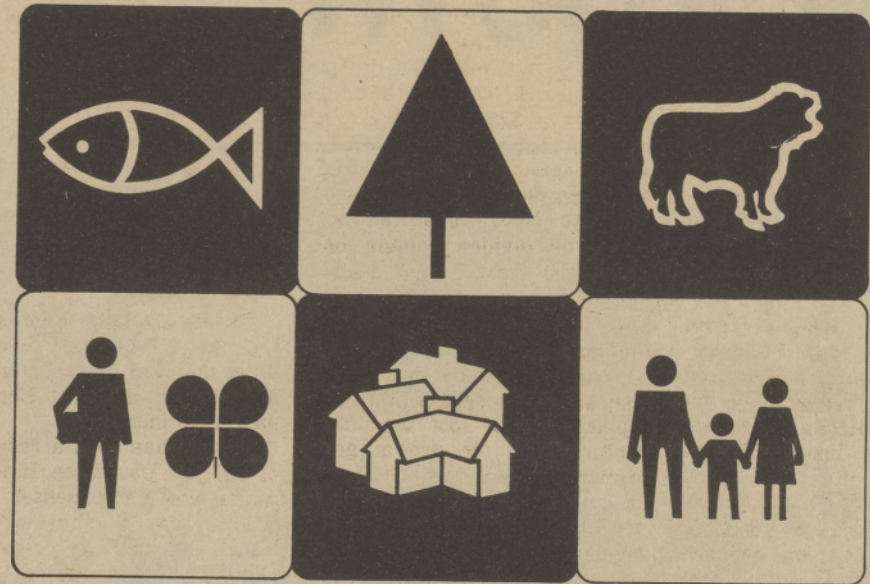
Extension best serves the needs of the Warm Springs Community when you participate with us in determining what our program will be and how it will be delivered.

HISTORY OF PROGRAM

Warm Springs Indian Reservation has been served by the Extension Service since 1956 through the Cooperative Extension Service at Oregon State University. Funds for the intensive Extension program from 1956 to 1973 were provided by a contract between the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Cooperative Extension Service with the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs contributing inkind services of office space, utilities, meeting rooms, audio visual equipment and duplicating services. In

1973 Cooperative Extension Service funding sources became limited and the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs provided money with the Bureau of Indian Affairs to fund the on going local program with the Cooperative Extension Service providing specialist backup support for the two agents.

Extension is organized under the Municipal Branch of the Tribal Government and under the Cooperative Extension Service at Oregon State University.

PURPOSE OF EXTENSION
