## Education meeting starts communication flow

The Tribal Education Committee, revitalized under a new ordinance, is making it clear that it can be a voice for the reservation only if it also lends an ear to community concerns. As an initial attempt at communication, the Committee held an informational meeting March 22 which was attended by about fifty people.

A panel of representatives of the various phases of education—from pre-school to adult programs—informed those at the meeting of the function, progress and problems of their sectors. People had ample opportunity to respond and air concerns.

Meeting the particular needs of Indian students in a public school system was the theme woven through the discussion. Mike Clements, chairperson of the Johnson-O'Malley Committee, described the many programs funded by JOM for Indian kids. Fairly recent developments have been the community liaisons in the grade school and junior high, the modular unit to house the skills center at the grade school and mini-courses for teaching crafts.

Pat Sanders, Chairperson of the Title IV-A Parent Committee, presented the Indian Education Act as another vehicle for ensuring that Indian students receive services.

While grade school principal Tony Miller seemed pleased with the impact of such services, the junior high principals, Phil Riley and John Sebastian, pointed to continued problems with attendance and discipline of Indian students. Riley indicated that the school had an obligation to make its programs worth coming to and Sebastian encouraged parental involvement.

The importance of parents taking some responsibility for educating their children was recognized by those at the meeting. Arlita Rhoan suggested workshops to increase awareness of parenting skills.

Keeping young people interested and involved in higher education was the concern of BIA Education Specialist Marlin Reimer. In order to hang onto their scholarships, students must maintain a minimum grade average and number of credits. Reimer indicated that other resources besides the Tribe and BIA should be looked into for assistance, especially for high-cost vocational training.

Jody Calica pointed to the responsibility of the Tribal Education Department in helping kids at the K-12 level find a direction. "If we have students who don't know where they're going," offered Jody, "then where are they going to end up?"

Calica advanced the idea of an alternative high school as a way of addressing special Indian needs, and supported the concept of a second chance for adults through adult learning.

It is expected that lines of communication opened at this meeting will help in accomplishment of the goals set forth in the revised education ordinance, which are: to preserve Indian heritage and identity, enhance positive self-image, encourage people to acquire basic skills and knowledge, and increase job and career awareness for the social and economic well-being of the individual and the Tribes.

## Parents advised on drug abuse

Verne Wardlow, coordinator of a Drug program in Albuquerque, New Mexico presented a series of workshops to the Warm Springs community on March 28-30th. About 80 parents and children heard Mr. Wardlow discuss the danger of inhaling paint and other volatile substances.

Mr. Wardlow emphasized the danger of a heart attack if

an individual who is intoxicated by paint, glue, gasoline or aerosol products is excited in any way. A heart attack and brain damage can occur even the first time these drugs are used.

He urged parents, school personnel and police to keep very calm when dealing with intoxicated persons for at least 6 - 18 hours while the drug is wearing off in order to lessen the possibility of the user suffering a heart attack.

Sniffing volatile substances results in permanent brain damage, loss of kidney and liver functioning, and bad breath. Mixing alcohol with ANY drug can produce violent havior and possibly death, said Mr. Wardlow.

Wardlow also stressed that punishing drug users is not a helpful way to discourage the use of drugs. "People take drugs because they are not happy and want the temporary 'high' that drugs offer", he said. In order to help drug users we need to gain their trust by learning the reasons for their unhappiness. We need to help them find other ways to feel "high".

Mr. Wardlow urged parents to gain family counseling through the Group Home Outreach program. "The use of drugs indicates that the entire family needs to learn new ways to communicate and find harmony."
