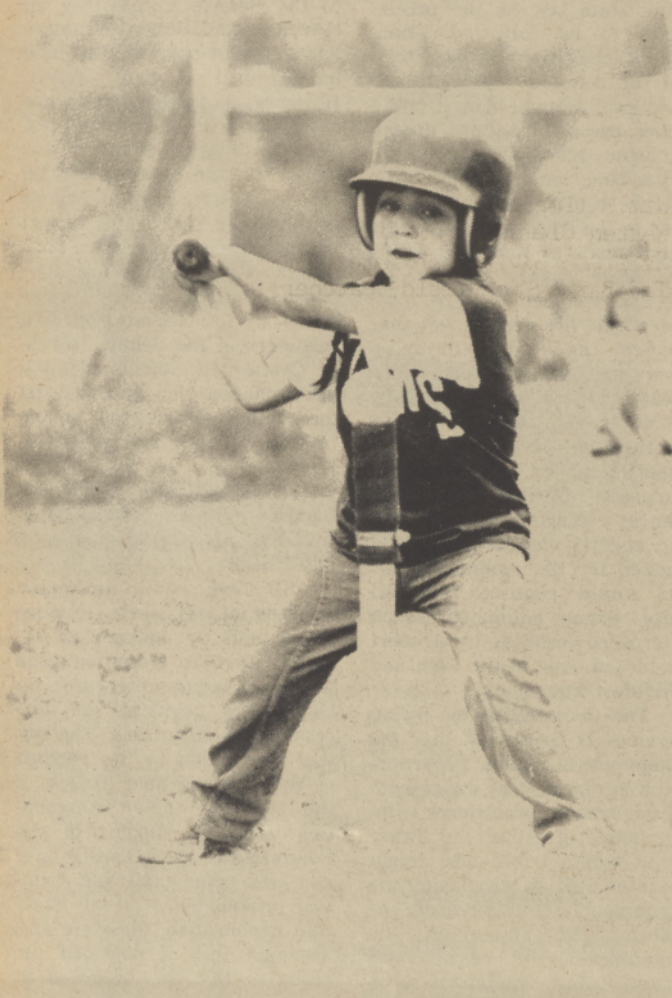

With 35 straight wins under their belts, the Papooses are the terror of the Little League majors.

"One of the things that helps us win is that we're the Papooses," said coach Satch Miller. They have the reputation now and the league is running scared.

Don't let it get around, but this year's team is almost an entirely new bunch of boys. Only the name is the same.

Miller lost the six players who earned spots on the district all-star team last season. He has some experienced pitchers but basically his team is pretty green.

So the coach is building the boys physical skills to match the awesome reputation and the team is hanging onto its record.

The Papooses' 190 runs in seven wins this year have been largely the result of opposing pitchers walking the batters around the bases. The Papooses have an experienced pitching staff: Maury Rhoads, Steve Fiala and Roman Suppah, who keep walks to a minimum. But the team is lacking the hitters it had last year.

Batting practice is paying off, however, and in the last game against Kiwanis the Papooses got 12 hits, the most they've made in a game this season, and only the second time they've out-hit the opposing team.

Roman Suppah is turning out to be the strongest hitter - with recent statistics like 4 for 5 and 2 for 3.

Coach Miller is even more interested in developing the players' "mental game." Confidence, awareness and good judgment are qualities he stresses. Good defense means thinking ahead and anticipating plays. Much of the nightly practice is spent on playing out game situations.

Miller sees improvement already, and although it's hard to top the Papooses' record, the team promises to be every bit as powerful as its name.

Annual All-Indian Rodeo

THE WARM SPRINGS RODEO ASSOCIATION is having their annual all Indian rodeo June 18-19, 1977, and will feature the standard events which will include saddle bronc, bareback, bull riding, calf roping, cow milking, team roping and the barrel race, other added attractions such as the wild horse race and a wildcow mad-scramble are also on the program, this will be an Oregon Indian Cowboys Association (OICA) sanctioned rodeo, however it will be open to any Indian cowboy who wishes to participate.

The books are now open for entry fees, and should be mailed to Eveline Patt, PO Box 27, Warm Springs, Oregon 97761, the books will close June 16th, at midnight. Only certified checks, money orders and

cash will be accepted, no personal checks please.

The entry fees are \$25.50 for the saddle bronc, bareback, calf roping, cow milking, and the barrel race, for bull riding the fees are \$30.50, and the team roping will be \$25.50 per man, \$30.00 per team in the wild horse race, and \$10.00 for the wildcow mad-scramble, there will be \$100.00 added to each event except for the wild-horse race and the mad-scramble.

There will be an additional \$5.00 charged to non-members of the OICA for entry fees. The rodeo will start at 1:00 p.m. each day. Stock contractors will be Earl Squiempfen, along with others that are unknown at the present time. An admission will be charged at the gate, concessions will be on the grounds.
